

MILLION NEW HOMES BADLY NEEDED; PLAN LOAN BANKS

One million new houses and apartments are needed throughout the country, the Department of Labor estimated today.

The war caused such a slackening up of the building industry in everything except war essentials that the demand for homes is now the greatest in the history of the country, officials stated.

Returns have been received from several hundred localities by the Public Works and Construction Division of the Labor Department, and in every one of them except a few of housing is reported.

New York City's Need Greatest. New York city shows the greatest need of housing, reports showing that housing for 75,000 families is needed.

The greatest demand there is for modern apartments and tenements. Philadelphia in a late report stated about 25,000 housing accommodations are needed.

These figures, officially, are not much higher than in most other localities when compared with the population. Before the war between 300,000 and 400,000 dwellings and apartments were built yearly, but during the war the annual figure, exclusive of those built by the Government, was cut down to about 25,000 for the whole country.

Efforts are being made by the department to get this vast amount of building under way at once. "Own-Your-Home" campaigns are being conducted in many cities with the view of having people put their higher wages into building new homes.

CLARK IN TRIBUTE TO MRS. HEARST

Tribute to the memory of Mrs. Phoebe A. Hearst was paid yesterday at the opening exercises of the National Cathedral School for Girls.

Miss Jessie Claire McDonald, principal of the school, told of the inspiring life of Mrs. Hearst, enlarging her as a sublime example of good womanhood.

"She was a friend, a wife, a mother," said Miss McDonald. "A mother in truth to young and old. She was steadily faithful in responsibilities and always faithful of self."

Plans are being formulated by the trustees of the school for a woman memorial to the noted woman, who devoted her life to the teaching of suffering and to the cause of education in all sections of her country.

Mrs. Hearst is the founder of the National Cathedral School for Girls, although the fact is not generally known, as Mrs. Hearst invariably was reticent about her acts of philanthropy.

Mrs. Hearst gave \$200,000 to the founding of the institution, which is considered one of the finest and best managed schools for girls in the country.

Speaker Clark in Tribute. Former Speaker Champ Clark yesterday issued the following tribute to Mrs. Hearst:

"The late Senator George Hearst and his wife Phoebe Hearst, who has just died in her beautiful California home, were both born and reared in my Congressional district."

"Of all the modern Argonauts, they were among the most successful. Senator Hearst was a man of great ability and force of character, liberal and generous."

"Mrs. Hearst was instant in every good work and was widely known for her numerous and splendid charities. She was universally beloved and will be universally mourned."

"She had only one child, William Randolph Hearst, but she left several grandchildren. "No nobler woman ever lived."

FUNERAL OF MRS. HEARST TO BE HELD TOMORROW AT GRACE CATHEDRAL

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15.—Funeral services for the late Mrs. Phoebe Apperson Hearst will be conducted tomorrow afternoon at Grace Cathedral in California street, Bishop William Ford Nichols officiating.

In the morning private services will be held at the Hearst home, Hacienda of the Yarns. The chapter of the cathedral will be represented by its lay delegates: William H. Crocker, L. F. Menzies, George A. Pope, Frank P. Deering and J. F. Langhorne.

The Grace Cathedral vestry choir of men and women and the male quartet of St. Luke's Church will sing the hymns "Peace, Perfect Peace," and "Abide With Me." A. J. Chaplin-Bayley will be at the organ.

Following the cathedral services the cortege will proceed to Cypress Lawn Cemetery, where interment will be in the family mausoleum beside the body of the husband, the late Senator George Hearst. The choir will sing "I Hear a Voice From Heaven," and "Now the Laborer's Task is O'er," after brief services at the cemetery.

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SAYS DEMOCRATIC OUTLOOK IS BRIGHT

Returning from an extended tour through Indiana, Ohio and Michigan, Chairman Homer S. Cummings, of the Democratic National Committee, today expressed unlimited confidence in the future outlook for party success.

Throughout his entire trip, which is the first since his election to the chairmanship, Cummings declared he found Democrats, particularly in Indiana and Ohio, in a "militant frame of mind and determined upon victory in 1920."

"I am convinced," said Cummings, "after carefully viewing the situation in Indiana and Ohio that we will carry both of these States in the next campaign. The party managers are energetic and forward-looking men who are thoroughly conversant with the temper of their electorate. They assured me that the Democrats in their sections were never more alive than they are today and I gained a like impression from personal observation."

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OUSLEY DEFENDS COTTON GROWERS

The demand that antitrust action be brought against the Southern Cotton Growers' Association was characterized as "absurd" today by Clarence Ousley, Acting-Secretary of the Department of Agriculture.

The demand for prosecution was made to the Department of Justice by Governor Allen of Kansas, who charged the cotton growers are organizing to reduce this year's cotton acreage and thus boost the price of raw cotton.

"You cannot indict a whole people," said Ousley, who stated the Agricultural Department will continue advising Southern farmers to plant more corn and foods needed on Southern farms.

"Planting more corn in the South can only be done at the expense of the cotton acreage."

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TO KEEP ARSENAL FOR MAKING GAS

BALTIMORE, April 15.—Edgewood Arsenal is to be continued as a separate unit by the Chemical Warfare Service of the army with a force of between 400 and 600 civilian employees under army direction, it is learned today.

It had been stated previously that the arsenal was to be turned over to the Ordnance Department, but this plan was changed last Friday, following a visit to the arsenal by Assistant Secretary of War Crowell, Major General Sybert and other officers.

After inspecting the plant, the War Department authorities decided to keep it for the manufacture of gas and gas shells. It also was found to be adapted for an army experimental station, particularly for experiments on gas shells.

The proving ground at Edgewood is to be maintained separately from the Aberdeen Proving Grounds, and is to be used exclusively for the testing of gas shells. The only other proving ground which the army had for testing gas shells—that at Lakeside, N. J.—has been abandoned recently and its equipment is to be moved down to Edgewood.

The manufacture of gas at Edgewood was discontinued some time ago, but is to be resumed by the Government as soon as definite plans for the continuance of the plant have been made. This would indicate that, despite forecasts to the contrary coming from Europe, the use of gas as an agency for destruction is not to be discontinued by civilized nations.

BASLE, April 15.—Count von Reventlow, former military expert of the Berliner Tageblatt, in an interview telegraphed here today, declared he favors restoration of a liberalized monarchy. "The militarist spirit does not exist in Germany," he was quoted as saying. "It is a spirit of defense, natural everywhere. If we had a national spirit as strong as the French, we would have won the first battle of the Marne. "I do not believe the present conference will make a general and lasting peace. Further war is inevitable. Peace cannot be just unless Germany is considered a belligerent, and treated as such."
