NUXATED IRON

ARE YOU KEEPING UP WITH THE TIMES?

BALTIMORE SCHOOL BURNS; 2 KILLED

BALTIMORE, April 25.—Gutted by a fire that started at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, St. Mary's Industrial School for Boys will rise from the ruins a greater and more modern institution, some of the trustees announced today.

The damage is estimated at \$500,000 and there is about \$100,000 insurance. Two firemen were killed and fourteen others were injured, besides two persons connected with the institution, when they battled with the flames. All but fifty of the 510 boys at the school were at play in the yard when the fire started. Those in the building were rescued. The fire is believed to have started from a tinner's torch on the roof.

Chapel Damaged. The chapel, connected with the main building by a wall three stories high, was burning four hours after the fire started, and was badly damaged. Practically all of the handsome paintings, some of them the work of noted artists, were saved. Among them was a recent painting of Cardinal Gibbons, chairman of the board of the institution.

All of the boys from the school have been placed in temporary quarters in other institutions in the city. The building occupied by the school was begun in 1866. At four different times additions were built, the last one being in 1913, when the chapel, itself worth several hundred thousand dollars, and the tower and front vestibule were built. It was considered one of the most beautiful institutions of the kind in the East.

It has long been regarded as an ideal institution. The staff consists of thirty brothers and thirty laymen, under the direction of Brother Paul.

Cared for Many Boys. More than 10,000 boys have been cared for at St. Mary's since its founding. The idea of the school originated with the Most Rev. John Spaulding, archbishop of Baltimore. The school was modeled on one in Belgium, which was under the direction of the Xaverian Brothers in Baltimore.

The school is not a reformatory. There are some cases where boys are committed to the care of the brothers by the courts, but as a rule the boys are there simply because they have no home.

St. Mary's is proud of her war record—more than 600 of the boys were in service for the United States during the war.

ARMY NURSES NEED RANK, FACTS SHOW

"I blush with shame when I think that American nurses are forced to sleep on railway station floors all night, while their officers and comfortable beds in the best hotels. That is what we did in Metz and what the nurses coming through are still doing."

This extract from the letters of an army nurse with the American expeditionary forces in Germany was read to the Maryland State Federation of Women's Clubs yesterday in McCoy Hall, Baltimore, by Mrs. Helen Greeley, who is counsel for the national committee to secure military rank for army nurses.

Another letter told how three medical officers who didn't like their quarters on shipboard on the way home last March tried to have seven nurses occupying two first-class cabins transferred to second-class cabins on the ground that their rank did not entitle them to first-class accommodations. Four of the seven nurses were too ill to be moved on the day when these doctors wanted their rooms. The story was bruited about the ship, and so much indignation was aroused by it that the officers decided not to move.

Another nurse wrote about the time and energy the nurses had to waste in trying to get the hospital orderlies to do their work properly. All such difficulties would automatically be eliminated by the conferring of rank upon the nurses, declared Mrs. Greeley. The Maryland federation passed a resolution endorsing the movement for rank for the nurses, and will support the bill for rank that is to be introduced at the extra session of Congress.

J. C. O'MAHONEY WINS TRIAL DEBATE AT GEORGETOWN

Joseph C. O'Mahoney won the trial debate held last night at Georgetown University to determine eligibility to participate in the annual Georgetown University prize debate. Mr. O'Mahoney was on the affirmative side of the question, "Resolved, That all proposed amendments to the United States Constitution should be ratified by three-fourths of the States through a direct vote of the people thereof."

The judges were J. Miller Kenyon of the Washington bar; Stephen Gregory, ex-president of the American Bar Association; and Harry F. Huddleston, chief of the public money division of the United States Treasury Department.

Other members of the debating teams were Edward J. Callahan, Joseph L. Hurley, affirmative; Robert M. McGauley, Cornelius R. Carl, John J. Mahan, negative.

MRS. WILSON PURCHASING "STUNNING" PARIS GOWNS

PARIS, April 25.—It is whispered that Mrs. Wilson, the President's wife, will have some stunning spring and summer gowns when she reaches America.

She has been making a number of trips to the shopping districts since returning to Paris, and she is also seeing the dressmakers. There is wild rivalry among the fashionable modistes for her custom, since they let it be known the American President's wife has been a patron.
