

SEE NEW CRISIS IN STEEL PRICE ROW

Belief persisted in official circles today that a new crisis would arise in the Industrial Board-Railroad Administration controversy over steel prices. Speculation was based on whether the steel producers' committee would come to Washington for further conference in view of Director General Hines' recent statements that the prices would have to be "considerably lower."

PLANE FALLS INTO RIVER; ONE DROWNS

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., April 28.—An airplane used by the New England Airplane Company, to carry passengers at a stipulated speed for every minute of flight, fell 150 feet into the Charles River basin and the passenger, J. Lester Allen, of the Dorchester district of Boston, was drowned. Ensign W. Elliott, Nightingale, the pilot, was severely bruised.

MOB OUSTS GIRL STRIKE-BREAKERS

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., April 28.—Two companies of State militia are on duty at Linton, Ind., today, following a riot last night when 500 persons smashed their way into the office of the Linton Telephone Company and compelled eight girl strike-breakers to leave the switchboard and seek refuge on the roof of the building.

DEMAND FOR U. S. FOOD TO CONTINUE

A continued heavy demand for American food products is certain according to a statement today by G. I. Christie, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture. This demand is assured, Christie asserted, by the disturbed conditions in Europe, the failure of the people in some countries to return to farming, and the unfitness for shipment of much Australian wheat.
