KILL DEPUTY AS HE LOADS SEIZED STILL ON TRAIN

BLUEFIELD, W. Va., May 14.—Deputy Sheriff H. M. Blankenship, of McDowell county, W. Va., was shot and killed at Jenkin Jones, near here, when a party of officers engaged in loading a captured still on a train was attacked by three alleged moonshiners. Will Murray, a member of the attacking party, and the man who is alleged to have shot Blankenship, was shot and seriously wounded by the latter before he lost consciousness.

Alex Billips, said by authorities to have been in the attacking party, is under arrest. Posses are searching for the third man.

WILL URGE BUDGET FOR U. S. EXPENSES

It appeared certain today that a budget system to regulate governmental expenditures will be adopted by the Congress which convenes next week. Congressman James W. Good, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, is preparing such a measure for introduction at the next session, and several members of the Senate are known to be working to the same end.

Mr. Good's bill will include a provision fixing responsibility for estimates submitted by heads of the executive departments and will place the preparation of the budget under the supervision of the President.

President Wilson is known to be strongly in favor of a budget system and is expected to recommend legislation looking to this end in his forthcoming message.

Secretary of the Treasury Glass is also giving the matter considerable study, and support of the measures is looked for from him.

Both Republicans and Democrats declared for a budget system in the platforms adopted at their last national conventions.

AIR MAIL LINE READY. CHICAGO, May 14.—Aerial mail delivery between Cleveland and Chicago will start tomorrow, according to postal officials here today. Eight machines will be employed, it was said. They will be employed in four, two going and two coming, according to the present program.

Wave of Spiritualism Sweeps Over England And Eases War Losses

LONDON, May 14.—Not the least interesting of the many revolutionary post-war waves sweeping over Great Britain is that of spiritualism, according to a copyright dispatch to the Philadelphia Public Ledger. Lord Rayleigh, scientist, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle are among its latest and most widely featured exponents. With his usual "sang froid" Doyle has boldly taken his stand upon the public platform, alongside Sir Oliver Lodge, Sir William Barrett, and Dr. A. R. Wallace, and in a recent tour of Scotland and north England he addressed more than fifty thousand people.

He says "Spiritualism is the biggest thing that has come into the world, and it is what the hearts of war victims—bereaved fathers, mothers, and wives are crying out for, consciously or unconsciously." Asked if he thought his meetings were a success, he said:

"Indeed, yes. Not once have I been interrupted, and everywhere people listen eagerly. They are tired of words which bring them no comfort and long for solid facts. It is the solid facts of human survival and spirit communication I tell them of."

Object to Mourning. A profound impression is always made by Sir Arthur when he tells his audience: "We believe in the depths of our souls that our heroes are here with us now and are not lying on the sands of Kut, Mesopotamia, or Palestine. They tell us that our mourning casts a cloud upon their happiness, that we should carry them with us in our lives and retain them as members of the family circle."

On Thursday night the annual convention of the Union of London Spiritualists at South Place Institute. The speakers include Miss Lindaf Hageby, James Coates and Ernest Hunt. Through the initiative of Thomas Hughes, the first Jewish Spiritualist society of England was founded last

week to investigate and demonstrate spiritual phenomena and to propagate its benefits to humanity.

Clergy all over the United Kingdom are aghast at the inroads of spiritualism under the direction of zealous converts. Their sermon attacks have only served to stimulate greater interest in the offered evidence of spirit recognition. New headquarters for soul readings, seances for investigators and clinics for shell-shock victims are opening up all over London. Public services are held every Sunday and Monday evenings in Steinway Hall, and they are crowded.

Says Husband Guilty.

Your correspondent talked with the widow of an officer of the Gordon Highlanders, who insisted she was in touch with her husband who was killed in France, and that he was directing her daily life. Another convert is the father of two dead sons, who alleged that he was holding nightly chats with his boys. I have conversed with many others who claimed to have bridged to the other world and all insist they began their investigations of psychical phenomena absolutely skeptical.

There are two groups active, one holding dark-room seances and the other advocates of light-room seances. Tom Thomas, a medium, admits it is impossible to make a dark seance fraud proof, but he welcomes honest wide-awake investigators, adding: "If a medium has powers which can only be demonstrated in the dark, then darkness is no evidence that genuine phenomena do not occur."

The general opinion one hears everywhere is that if spiritualism can ease the pain of any aching heart and restore gladness, then it is a good thing, no matter what its detractors may say.

U. S. YARDS TO BUILD SHIPS FOR EUROPE

Orders for possibly three million gross tons of ships to be built for foreign account in American shipyards may be placed as the result of an order by President Wilson permitting the building of such ships provided it could be done without interfering with the construction of the American merchant marine. The President's action was announced in a statement issued at the White House. The order was suggested by Chairman Hurley of the Shipping Board.

Norway is expected to place large orders, possibly 1,000,000 tons, and France and Italy probably will let contracts for considerable tonnage. It was explained, but England is not expected to place any orders in American yards.

At the Shipping Board it was explained that few orders could be placed immediately, as the capacity of the yards for foreign account was yet limited.

In respect to the prices to be quoted by American shipbuilders to foreign interests it was recalled that the last price made for ships built in American yards was \$170 a ton. All contracts for foreign ships will be placed privately. Shipping Board officials said, but under the general supervision of the board.

LIVE WIRE KILLS LINEMAN. YORK, May 14.—Charles Snell, a lineman employed by the Edison Electric Light Company, was killed last night when he came in contact with a live wire while making repairs on a line south of this city. It is said that 2,200 volts of electricity passed through his body. He was hurled from the top of the pole to the ground, a distance of forty feet.

GLASS URGES PURCHASE OF WAR SAVINGS STAMPS

With the Victory loan now closed the importance of the war savings stamp is emphasized by Secretary Glass in a statement urging the cooperation of bankers and merchants in placing this investment before the American people.

"While no definite decision has been reached, it is extremely probable that war savings stamps or some variation of them in shape or name will be a permanent institution," said the Secretary, who cites the stamps as an excellent investment for the average man.

BLAMES LAX SOCIAL LAWS FOR RED-ISM

BOSTON, May 14.—That the I. W. W. attained its growth in the Northwest of "lax social laws and economic injustice worked by the moneyed interest" was the statement of Mayor Ole Hanson of Seattle, speaking before the Employers' Association of eastern Massachusetts.

"The men who made up the membership of this undesirable society were men who were made bitter by wrongs committed by the lumber kings of Washington and Oregon," charged the Seattle executive.

He continued that the movement was losing force now, as employers and all citizens were realizing they could not leave the workmen to himself without suffering.

YANKS RETURN TO FARMS. The majority of soldiers who entered the army from farms are returning to their work on the farms upon being discharged, according to an announcement by the Department of Agriculture. Careful surveys made by farm-help specialists were said to refute published statements that from 75 to 90 per cent of the farmers in the army were seeking other occupations.
