NEW YORK, May 15.—Mrs. Victoria McKenzie, a widow, seventy-five years old, the complaining witness against Richard H. Lane, lawyer, who is being tried in the criminal branch of the Supreme Court on a charge of obtaining \$8,500 from her on false representations, was accused yesterday by the defendant's wife, Mrs. Ann Lane, of having offered her \$2,000 to divorce Lane. She had taken a trip in July, 1916, with Mrs. McKenzie to the Luray caverns in Virginia and to Washington. She said that she became suspicious and had a separation agreement drawn when stories told her by Mrs. McKenzie caused her to doubt her husband.

Judge Rosalby asked. "Yes," said Tracy. "Do you know who Colonel Hay-

ward is?" was the next question. "No," replied the prisoner. "Then you ought to get the electric chair," smiled Judge Rosalby. "Colonel Hayward is not only a mighty good lawyer, but one of the greatest heroes of the world war." Savage was killed when Tracy, fooling with an old pistol, told friends standing near to watch him "secure this guy." The "unloaded weapon" ran true to form. No date for the trial has been set.


