

ELKS INITIATE 271 AT BIG CEREMONY

The biggest event in the history of Washington Elksdom took place last night when more than 1,000 Elks attended the ceremonies in connection with the initiation of 271 candidates in the big ball room of the Willard.

In connection with the initiation ceremonies the unofficial drive of the Salvation Army, which officially begins next Monday, was started by the Elks of Lodge No. 15. While the members were listening to speeches the strains of a hand organ were heard, and into their midst came a giant Elk turning the crank of the organ with one hand and leading a monkey with the other.

Three Speakers. Harry King, chairman of the membership committee, who told of the aims of the society; Rabbi Abram Simon, who described the valor of American troops in France, and Joseph Burkhart, who discussed the Elks' part in the work of reconstruction, were the speakers.

Mr. Burkhart told of a \$250,000 hospital for the treatment of maimed soldiers which has been provided by the Elks. It is the first of its kind, he said.




