

GREEK KING DECORATES SEVEN AMERICAN NURSES

ATHENS, June 8.—King Alexander today conferred the medal of military merit on the Misses Sarah Adair, of Baltimore, Md.; Marie Clauberg, of Chicago; Alma Hartz, of Davenport, Iowa; Isabel Martin, of San Francisco; Emily Porter, of Bridge-

port, Conn.; Clarissa Blakeslee, of Drexel Hill, Pa.; Edith Glenn, of Bristol, Pa.; and Florence Stone, of Plainfield, N. J., Red Cross nurses, for their work in fighting the typhus epidemic in Macedonia. Miss Blakeslee contracted typhus while nursing, but has entirely recovered.

The King made a brief address to the nurses, thanking them for saving the lives of a great many Greeks who returned from Bulgaria after the armistice was signed.

GIANT APPLE CROP ON POTOMAC SHORE

HAGERSTOWN, Md., June 8.—Present indications point to an enormous crop of apples in the fruit country along the Potomac river. The apple crop in Berkeley county is estimated at two million barrels alone, while the North Mountain fruit-bearing lands are expected to produce one hundred thousand barrels.

Orchards in other sections of Maryland, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, and Virginia will yield a large crop of apples and peaches.

One-Legged Heroes Race as One-Armed Yankees Play Ball

DES MOINES, Iowa, June 8.—Wounded heroes of European battlefields, some with only one leg or one arm, and a few without any legs, yesterday played baseball for the guests of the war workers' hotel at Union Station Plaza.

The race was given in honor of the girls who reside in the Capitol group, the plaza colony having been similarly entertained a week ago.

Francis Ruddy and Lettie Marie Barrett, winners of the Castle Cup at a contest in New York, gave an exhibition dance. House managers of the several dormitories acted as chaperones.

Rain broke up the baseball game between the one-legged men and the one-armed men, but the 2,000 spectators were well satisfied that while the wounded soldiers, may be handicapped, they decidedly are not downhearted.

The feature of the day was the baseball game, which the one-armed men won, 2 to 1, in three innings. Because of the fear of injuring some of the patients, an indoor baseball was used.

The individual star of the day was D. R. McGiboney, of Springfield, Mo., who lost a leg in the Ninety-first Division's offensive in the Argonne. He won the 30-yard hop for one-legged men, finished second in the manual of arms drill, which also was for one-legged men, and with Ted Basals, of Danville, Ill., was second in the two-legged race for two men, such men having one amputation. He hopped the 30 yards in 6 1/2 seconds.

NEEDN'T PAY FOR WIFE'S VACATION

NEW YORK, June 8.—Summer vacations are not looked upon by law as necessities and should a wife take the children to either the seashore or country to escape the discomforts of hot weather without first consulting her husband about the whereabouts he cannot be taxed later with the cost.

That was the gist of a decision handed down yesterday by Justices Bijur and Pendleton in the appellate term of the supreme court.

The victory for husbands came about in this way: Catherine Stevens owns a summer boarding house where Mrs. Harry J. Hush spent last summer with her four children. Mr. Hush was left behind, and when he received a bill for \$179 he demurred. The vacation was not his. Whereupon Mrs. Stevens sued and got a judgment, which Mr. Hush promptly appealed. He said Mrs. Hush made the contract without his knowledge.

Justice Pendleton held any husband who provides one home for his wife meets all the requirements of the law. Places of abode other than the usual one cannot be classed as necessities, regardless of how the mercury flits skyward.

By another route of reasoning Justice Bijur arrived at the same conclusion. "It is well settled that a husband owes to his wife and children the duty of supporting them in a style commensurate with his position in life," he remarked. "Therefore if the objects contracted for by the wife lie within the category of what are usually, though perhaps not happily, designated as 'necessaries' the sole defense that the husband may successfully interpose is that he has actually furnished them or the means to obtain them."

TO INVESTIGATE ZION CITY AND SIFT GRAFT CHARGE

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 8.—The House late Thursday, without a record vote, adopted the report of the joint committee, named to investigate Zion City, Ill., in which Wilbur Glenn Voliva, successor of John Alexander Dowdy, is charged with conducting a banking business "when he is financially insolvent," that he is obtaining money and property by practicing a confidence game, that he is illegally making use of the United States mail, and that he is guilty of other offenses.

BOYCOTT OF STUDENTS AGAINST JAPS SPREADS

PEKING, June 8.—The anti-Japanese boycott, which is being fostered by the national students' organization in Peking, is spreading throughout China. The minister of education and the vice minister have resigned.

Demonstrations were resumed today in Peking where thousands of workmen are on strike. The university has been closed and converted into a military camp.

A mandate issued by the president yesterday, ordering the students to return to their studies has not been obeyed. The students of Nanking College appear to be leading the anti-Japanese movement.
