

WIFE RESENTS PLEA OF UNWRITTEN LAW

MUSKOGEE, Okla., June 23.—Because Buster Hogan pleaded the unwritten law in his defense for the killing of Cleve Horton at the Hogan home in August, 1913, Mrs. Gertie Hogan filed suit for divorce. She alleged that Hogan's plea was false, that it cast a shadow over her reputation, and in addition that he had failed in support of her and had been faithless.

In the same court room then, where two months ago Hogan had been acquitted on the murder charge, Mrs.

Hogan was granted a writ of separation, together with alimony of \$40 a month and the custody of their four children. Hogan did not contest the case.

Pessoa, Miss Laurita Pessoa and the members of his suite, and the party made the trip down the Potomac aboard the President's yacht, the Mayflower, with the Secretary of the Navy and Mrs. Daniels as hosts. A buffet luncheon was served aboard and tea on the return cruise.

Over 150 guests were asked to meet Dr. and Mme. Pessoa and take part in the interesting ceremonies; and among those in the company were the Vice President and Mrs. Marshall, several Cabinet officers, with their wives; the Acting Secretary of State and Mrs. Polk, William Phillips, Assistant Secretary of State; the Third Assistant Secretary of State and Mrs. Breckinridge Long; the charge d'affaires of Brazil, Mr. Moreira; the Governor of Virginia and Mrs. Davis, many members of
