FORMAL SIGNING OF TREATY TO TAKE PLACE THURSDAY OR FRIDAY

PARIS, June 24.—Formal signing of the peace treaty is to take place Thursday or Friday in Versailles, it was indicated in official circles today.

Secretary Dutasta, of the peace conference, suggested to Herr Von Lersner that the ceremony take place Thursday, but it was later said that the ceremony might be deferred until Friday.

At Versailles, all parts of the palace connected with signing the treaty have been temporarily closed to the public. Louis XIV carpets, never used heretofore, have been laid in the famous hall of mirrors, in the middle of which has been placed the plenipotentiary's horseshoe table.

PARIS, June 24.—It is now expected that the treaty of peace will be formally signed Thursday afternoon, President Wilson sailing for home the following day.


20,000 TURK SOLDIERS MARCH UPON GREEKS, VIOLATING ARMISTICE
