Clyde Kelly of Pennsylvania have returned to Washington after a prolonged visit in eastern Europe. It was not until two weeks ago that they learned that the President had called an extra session.

SINN FEINERS OUT TO CAPTURE IRISH COURTS

decided to contest all seats for county and district courts in Ireland. Gaelic speakers are, as far as possible, to be elected so that the proceedings may be conducted in the Irish language as was done at the opening session of the Irish Republican convention (Dail Eireann).
