HALF MILLION FIRE IN CORDAGE PLANT

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., July 2.—Half a million dollars' damage was done by fire which destroyed warehouses of the Indianapolis Cordage Company here yesterday. Twelve thousand bales of steel for binder twine was among the stock consumed by the flames. Within three minutes after the blaze started the fiber was a seething furnace. Fire department officials said it would be impossible to quench the flames within two days. Defective wiring was blamed.

"Retreat? Hell, No," Says D. C. Devil Dog Captain, Holding Post Till Death

"Retreat? Hell, no!" This famous American reply to a French order when Americans moved into the Chateau-Thierry sector for their test of fire has at last been very clearly traced to a marine captain. It was stated authoritatively today that the emphatic Yank answer, attributed for months to Gen. Omar

Chateau-Thierry, despite his repeated denial, came from Capt. Lloyd M. Williams, 51st company, 5th Marines. Six days later, Captain Williams, gassed and torn by shrapnel, died as he was placed in an ambulance. A French division, exhausted by days of desperate fighting against the relentless German advance, was withdrawing down shell-torn roads around Chateau-Thierry, past the relieving 24 division. Captain Williams' company of the 2d half doughboys and half marines, with a sprinkling of navy medical men, was awaiting the withdrawal of the French. They were taking for the first time the front line positions which Americans were to hold against the pick of the German shock troops.

"Hell, No," His Reply. A French major, moving with his battalion along the dark road and believing a general withdrawal had been ordered, told Williams to follow. "Retreat?" the American asked. "Hell, no!" Williams reported the incident to his battalion commander, Colonel (then major) F. W. Wise. The message, according to officers who said they saw it, was "French drawing back through us. French major ordered me to withdraw with him. Told him to go to hell."

"WILLIAMS, C. O." The company, with the rest of the 2d, completed their relief and formed a line the German never broke. Captain Williams was killed six days later—June 12, 1918. Gassed and wounded by shrapnel, he was carried to the rear by four German prisoners. On the way back, a shell struck nearby. Two of the stretcher bearers were killed and Captain Williams was thrown to the ground. He lived, however, until he was placed in an ambulance. A distinguished service cross for extraordinary heroism was sent later to his home at Berryville, Va., where he had lived before he graduated from Virginia Polytechnic Institute. Since 1910, when he entered the marines, he had made his home at Washington.

Attributed To Many. Though every hour of the following four weeks was filled with excitement, officers and men who heard of or saw the incident remembered it and repeated it. Then it followed the usual course of stories. First the saying was attributed to the battalion commander, Colonel Wise; then to General (then colonel) W. C. Neville, commanding the Fifth Marines; then to Gen. James G. Harbord, commanding the marine brigade of the Second division, and finally to General Bundy, division commander, according to officers.

General Bundy, now in command of Camp Lee, Va., when interviewed at Camp Lee by a United Press correspondent, denied emphatically he had made the statement. He refused to discuss the incident for publication. Officers of the Second division declared flatly that Williams made the statement and that, passed along by word of mouth, its authorship had been credited to increasingly higher officers.

The message was a part of the records of the Second battalion, Fifth Marines—now a part of the army of occupation—it was stated. The fact that it did not come to light before was because few men knew of it, and they, in the exciting months that followed, were unable to stop the international publicity given it, it was said.

HELD SATURDAY CLASSES, NOW WANT EXTRA PAY

GALENA, Kan., July 1.—The school teachers of the Galena public schools have brought suit for two weeks' salary against the school board. For two weeks last fall and winter the schools were closed on account of the "flu" epidemic. The board of education endeavored to make up the lost time by having school on Saturdays. This was too strenuous, so the teachers objected, and it was stopped. Now the teachers want pay for the extra Saturdays.

G. J. GOULD PLANS TO APPEAL.

NEW YORK, July 2.—Counsel for George J. Gould has announced that an appeal would be taken immediately from the order of Justice Whitaker dismissing their client as executor of the \$80,000,000 Gould estate. Frank J. Gould, who sought the order, automatically succeeds George Gould as chief executor.

ST. PAUL LABOR MAN HAS BIG MAJORITY

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 2.—Oscar Keller, independent labor candidate for Congress, to succeed the late C. C. VanDyke, as Congressman from St. Paul, was elected by a majority of 3,000, according to figures on the election compiled today.


