### Ghost of War Gas Gets Ex-Soldiers; Scores Are In Baltimore Hospital

BALTIMORE, July 15.—Like a venetian ghost of days that a man would rather forget, the old war gas is coming back to haunt and sicken Baltimore soldiers who fought in France.

Most of them are out at the Marine Hospital, sitting around on the edges of their beds in civilian clothes, wondering when the war will actually be over for them.

Scattered around through the hospital are something like a score of Baltimore men, all suffering from some form of relapse of the effects of gas attacks.

With quiet and proper treatment they all probably will get well, but with some of them this war of the old fighting days will linger for months, now sleeping, now waking, to wreck their health and peace.
