JAPANESE PREMIER PROMISES REFORMS

NEW YORK, July 16.—Following publication of allegations by the Federal Council of Churches, charging Japanese atrocities in Korea, cables were received here from Premier Hara, of Japan, promising full investigation and immediate reform in the province. Coming so closely with the charges, the premier's dispatches are regarded as a virtual admission of the truth of some of the charges brought by missionaries and other witnesses.

SEVEN ARRESTED IN DRUG RAIDS IN N. Y.

NEW YORK, July 16.—Federal officials here have begun a campaign to stamp out the traffic in habit forming drugs. Seven arrests in two spectacular raids on drug stores last night turned up seven prisoners. Six were charged with violation of the Harrison anti-drug act, while the other, an alleged idiot, was held as a material witness. In one drug store several hundred ounces of narcotics were seized. Hundreds of prescriptions for the drugs were found, said to be signed by physicians. The agents, after closing this place, moved to another drug store on the edge of the theatrical district, where they found practically the same conditions.



MRS. MARTHA J. McCANN.



EX-YANKS TO HELP RUN RUSSIAN RAILS

Soldiers who have returned from France and gone back into civilian life are getting ready to go to Russia to run the railroads there. Daniel Willard, president of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, and his chiefs are picking the men, and nearly a score of Washington and Maryland boys have applied for jobs on the lines that curl for hundreds of miles through the snowy wastes of the land that bore Czars and Bolsheviks. They will belong to the Russian Railway Service Corps, which has been organized by the director general of military railways in Washington. The work of the corps is expected to put new life into Russia, carrying the enthusiasm and initiative of the American railroad man into a country of vast spaces that have hitherto been but desolately bridged by railroads and building systems of quick modern transportation that will link together Russians of sections of the country that have virtually always been foreign to each other. They will work on roads that are under the allied control. Through the efforts of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad, co-operating with Col. H. Wright, of the office of the chief of engineers of the Bureau of Military Railways, Washington and Maryland men will play a big part in this practical effort to rejuvenate Russia. These American railway pioneers in Russia will sail from San Francisco, landing either at Yokohama or Vladivostok. They will be in the army or subject to army regulations, but they will wear uniforms.

50 COPS IN RIOT CALL AS TWO WOMEN FIGHT

NEWARK, N. J., July 16.—Two women fighting in front of the Newark jail were responsible for the police of that city sending out a riot call, to which fifty policemen responded in seven patrol wagons from so many police stations. The jail is in the Fourth precinct and the report received at that station was that there was a riot in progress. Instantly the desk lieutenant surmised prisoners might be getting away and sent word to headquarters. A general alarm was telegraphed to the other police stations, nightsticks.

12 KILLED IN U. S. OIL VESSEL BLAST

LONDON, July 16.—An explosion occurred in the American oil tank steamer Roseleaf in the drydock at Cardiff on Monday, in which twelve lives were lost. Following a loud report, which was heard all over the Butte docks, flames burst from the ship and clouds of smoke covered the vessel. Several men were blown into the air higher than the masts by the force of the explosion. One man, believed to have been a workman on board, was blown from the hold into the bottom of the dock, which was dry at the time. Another man was blown off the deck over a shed at the side of the drydock and fell on the corrugated iron roof of a tool shed with such force that the roof was dented. He fell into the foreyard facing the offices and suffered such injuries that he died almost instantly. The names of the dead identified are: Frederick Haggarty, George Davies, T. T. Morris, A. Davies, T. Barnett, E. Craig, J. Powell, Archibald Lewis, Walter Routh, P. Thomas, H. Falgrave, and Frederick Algar.


