LONDON, July 28.—The Bolsheviki have met with a reverse in the Archangel region, and have retired along the railway, according to reports reaching here.

A second wireless message stated that enemy pressure has caused them to retire also along the Luga road about thirty miles east of Pskov, along the Pskov-Polotsk railroad to twenty miles south of Pskov.

ONEY CARSTARPHEN DIES AT HOSPITAL

TAIL-SPINS TO DEATH IN FALL OF 4,000 FEET

HOUSTON, Tex., July 28.—Lieut. Francis M. Bryan, of Morencio, Ariz., an Ellington field pilot, was instantly killed, and Private Will Poncik, of Holland, Tex., member of a recruiting detachment, was seriously injured when an airplane in which they were flying fell here yesterday. The plane entered a direct tail spin at about 4,000 feet, came out of the spin at about 1,500 feet, and then entered a flat-tail spin and crashed through the trees to the ground.

SAVANNAH, Ga., July 28.—Frank L. Moye, formerly a lieutenant in the aviation service, was struck on the head by the propeller of a visiting airplane here yesterday and died a few hours later. Moye, who had been working as a newspaper reporter here since his discharge from the army, was a native of Washington, Ga.

LANDLADY IS SHOT DEAD BY BOARDER

Martha Barton, colored, thirty years old, living in Cullinane court southwest, was shot and killed yesterday afternoon following a quarrel with James Rivers, colored, said to be a boarder at the woman's home, who the police charge with the shooting. At the same time, the police declare, Rivers wounded two other negroes who attempted to interfere.

The woman died in the ambulance en route to the Emergency Hospital, and Rivers was arrested a half hour after the shooting by Policeman Heatcote, of the Fourth precinct, in the vicinity of the Highway bridge. He is charged with murder.



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
