

CHICAGO DEALER ON UNFAIR LIST

CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—Announcing a secret watch on 2,100 Chicago retail grocers, United States District Attorney Charles E. Cline today declared he had started an unfair list for profiteering grocers and already placed at its head the name of a dealer who charged 10 cents a pound for sugar and \$4.80 a bushel for potatoes.

Evidence against the grocers will be turned over to the September grand jury, Cline said, and arrests will follow.

BOTANIC GARDEN BILL REPORTED OUT

The Senate District Committee is expected to report a resolution offered by Senator Phelan, of California, today, as to the advisability of establishing a botanic garden of suitable size in or near the District of Columbia.

Senator Phelan said the Fine Arts Commission, to which he has submitted such a plan, favors the acquisition of Mt. Hamilton tract, comprising about 400 acres. His resolution, which was referred to the District Committee, carried an appropriation of \$2,000 for the drawing of plans.

ALEXANDRIA NEWS

ALEXANDRIA, Va., Aug. 20.—Delegates W. A. Smoot, representing this city and Alexandria county in the State legislature, has introduced a bill authorizing the town of Potomac, Alexandria county, to issue bonds to an amount not to exceed \$50,000, to be expended for the construction and maintenance of a sewerage system. The bond issue is contingent upon the wishes of a majority of the qualified voters of the town.

Divers To Search Bed Of Lake For Girl's Body

ITHACA, N. Y., Aug. 20.—Search for the body of Miss Hazel Crance, the pretty eighteen-year-old girl who was drowned in Lake Cayuga while canoeing with Donald W. Fether, Cornell sophomore and son of a wealthy Los Angeles oil magnate, was continued today.

Divers will be employed in several days to search the bed of the lake in the vicinity of the tragedy.

Student Is Freed.

Fether was freed by Supreme Court Justice Kiley at Cazenovia last night on a writ of habeas corpus, who held that the authorities had not obtained sufficient evidence to longer detain the student on the charge of murdering Miss Crance.

Mrs. Fether, the student's mother, arrived here last night, too late to attend the hearing. When her son returned from Cazenovia Mr. Fether rushed to him and embraced him.

"I can't say how glad I am to be free," Fether said. "I am more happy for my mother's sake."

Tears were in his eyes as he met his mother.

CAZENOVIA, N. Y., Aug. 20.—Witness revelations as depicted by Robert Crance, father of Hazel Crance, victim in the Lake Cayuga mystery, brought psychological elements into the case yesterday.

While motoring sixty miles from Ithaca to this village the sun-browned man, as rugged and as practical as a Blue Ridge mountaineer, said:

"I was warned almost nightly in dreams of the fate that would take my daughter from me. A village girl had a dream last night indicating where the body is to be found. I am awaiting a vision which has been promised me within the week and you can depend upon it that the mystery of my daughter's death in Lake Cayuga will be solved."

Father Attends Hearing.

Crance attended the hearing of the writ of habeas corpus which was argued by counsel for Fether. The father of the girl and the man who escorted her in the tragic canoe ride met in Justice Kiley's chambers here. The father glared as he seated himself.

Wife No. 1 Will Become Bride No. 3 of Divorced Millionaire Hat Maker

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—William J. Dunlap, the rich son of the late Robert Dunlap, millionaire hat manufacturer, who has appeared in the news off and on since 1895 in connection with his adventures in matrimony, is in the spotlight again.

Two important pieces of news about Mr. Dunlap were learned today. The first was that he and his second wife have been divorced. The second news item was that he is about to marry again. And the point of it all is that the prospective Mrs. Dunlap No. 3 is the very same person who became Mrs. Dunlap No. 1 twenty-four years ago.

At the time of his first marriage Dunlap was twenty-four. His bride was Lulu E. Freer, then sixteen, whom everybody in Monticello, N. Y.—except the other girls—agreed was "the prettiest girl in Sullivan county."

The wedding took place in New Jersey in 1895. It was a secret wedding, and was said to have been the result of a dare. Dunlap was said to have told the girl she did not have "nerve" enough to go to a justice of the peace with him and get married. She accepted this unconventional proposal and the wedding took place forthwith. Two months later the wedding was announced. From newspaper accounts at the time, Dunlap's family was not pleased.

Husband Won a Divorce.

In 1903 friends of the couple were surprised to learn that the courts had granted a divorce to the husband. Mrs. Dunlap did not defend the case. It was generally understood that she had received a money settlement, but her close friends said this was not the only reason she consented to the divorce. They insisted that she was so devoted to her husband that she was willing to do anything for his happiness.

In February, 1907, Dunlap figured as a leading character in another dramatic love story. Miss Florence Pitt, a wealthy young woman of Stamford, Conn., sued him for \$25,000, alleging that, in September, 1906, after becoming engaged to marry, they registered at a New York hotel as man and wife, after which Dunlap refused to marry her.

The most remarkable feature of this case was that the girl's lawyer

Byers, a beautiful manicurist. Until the present time nothing has been published about their divorce. All that could be learned today was that a divorce had been obtained. Mrs. Dunlap was in Garden City, L. I., and Dunlap in Salt Lake City, Utah.

A few months ago Dunlap met his first wife in New York for the first time in many years. She was living quietly in an apartment near Riverside Drive. The story goes that she had lived in hope that her former husband would return to her some day. She is still very beautiful. In a short time Dunlap was markedly attentive to her, and he finally announced to his friends that they would be married again. The marriage will take place in Salt Lake City, August 25. At the home of Dunlap's second

wife in Garden City, a servant said she "supposed" the Dunlaps had been divorced some time. To make a happy ending for this story, it may be said that Dunlap's family, who opposed his first marriage to Miss Freer twenty-four years ago, are in favor of the couple's second wedding. And next year they can celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of their first wedding.
