### WOMEN BEAT MEN WHO O. K.'D BALLOT

Members of Atlanta Democratic Committee Voted Out After Suffrage Row. ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 4.—Members of the city Democratic executive committee, which recently granted Atlanta women the privilege of voting in the Democratic white primary appear to have been defeated to a man, and according to E. C. Buchanan, chairman, the result was due to feminine votes. Members of this committee are elected in the primary at which city officials are nominated and after granting the primary ballot to women, committee members became embroiled with suffrage leaders over disposal of the \$2,768 registration fees the women paid. Newspaper reports showed that a far greater percentage of women voted than men. Aldermen, councilmen and other municipal officers were nominated in the primary, which normally is equivalent to election.

### PERSHING LIFE RANK O. K.'D BY PRESIDENT

President Wilson last night, before leaving on his tour of the country, signed the bill to make permanent the rank of general for John J. Pershing, commander of the American expeditionary forces. He sent the nomination to the Senate. Confirmation of the nomination is expected before General Pershing reaches the United States early next week.

### WOULD FEDERATE ALL WAR BODIES

OMAHA, Sept. 4.—C. E. Adams, commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, has announced that he will recommend at the national encampment at Columbus next week that steps be taken to federate the Grand Army of the Republic, American Legion, Spanish War Veterans and all other patriotic organizations. The purpose of the federation, Commander Adams said would be to further Americanism and insure united harmonious action against influences seeking to disrupt the Government.

### FIND COAL IN GERMANY.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 4.—According to a London copyrighted cable the Philadelphia Public Ledger, it is reported that the coal in strata twelve to sixteen yards thick has been found in Steinheim and Binsebeck, communities in the government district of the Minden, Westphalia. The mine field area is 2,200,000 square meters (54,646 acres). Two mining companies have been established.

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**HUNGARY PREMIER TO STAY IN OFFICE**

Friedrich to Wait for Election Despite Any Contrary Wish of the Entente.

BUDAPEST, Sept. 4.—Premier Stephen Friedrich declared today that he will remain in power until the Hungarian general election, despite any wishes of the Entente to the contrary and the report that he was ready to retire. "A large section of the Hungarian people is said to be insistent that Premier Friedrich resign because of the opposition in Paris. "I intend to remain in office until the election for I know a great majority of all parties is behind me despite the fact that the entente will not recognize me," said Friedrich. "I merely ask that my government be tolerated until the Hungarians can freely express their wishes. I am quite willing that a deputation of socialists from all of the Allied countries should supervise the Hungarian election to see that they are conducted fairly. "The election results will demonstrate that those who attack me are mistaken."

**Not Anti-Semitic.**

Asked if his government policy was anti-semitic, the Premier answered: "It is untrue to say that it is. I preserve a perfectly open and liberal mind on Jewish questions. The Premier was then told that stories of "white terrorism" were being circulated and was asked what measures the government was taking to suppress them. Friedrich replied: "The government has done everything to prevent the hanging and beating of Bolsheviks but you must remember that the Bolsheviks tortured and murdered hundreds of innocent peasants. It is only natural that their relatives want to revenge themselves but we do the best we can to prevent it."

**Carry Out People's Wishes.**

"Is there any truth in the report that the Rumanians are behind you?" Friedrich was asked. He retorted: "They are neither behind us or before us, but are in our midst." Premier Friedrich was then reminded that the Hungarians do not want a return of the Hapsburgs and asked for his own opinion upon the disposition of the throne. He answered: "I am willing to carry out to the utmost limit the wishes of the Hungarian people."

Further reports of the beating and massacre of Jews in the provinces have reached Budapest. It is said that many women and children fled from their homes, hiding in corn fields and forests in fear of their lives. There is evidence that whole families, from the grandmother down to the youngest child have been wiped out.

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
