### SAY LANSING IS UNLIKELY TO QUIT

Question Raised As Result of Bullitt Statement to Foreign Relations Committee.

The quoted interview with Secretary of State Lansing, which was related to the Foreign Relations Committee by William C. Bullitt Friday, in which the Secretary declared that the peace treaty was bad and the League of Nations worthless, has caused a profound sensation among members of the Senate.

In discussions of the testimony by Senators yesterday, two questions were asked:

1—Will it cause Secretary Lansing to resign?

2—What will be the effect of the revelations upon the country?

Secretary Lansing's friends were quick to assert that he will not resign and that the testimony, startling as it is, affords no reason why he should resign. It was pointed out that his resignation at this time would be construed as an admission by him that his opinion of the treaty was correctly reported and that he was in the wrong in voicing any opinion in opposition to the President while in Paris.

Among State Department officials the belief was expressed that Secretary Lansing may again be called to testify before the committee. In his testimony given several weeks ago Secretary Lansing declined to enter into any discussion of the attitude of Colonel House, General Bliss, Mr. White, and himself respecting the treaty provisions. But as the committee is now fortified by Mr. Bullitt's testimony, it is believed that another effort may be made to get Secretary Lansing to talk about these matters, especially as Bullitt quoted him and Bliss and White as being not enthusiastic over the treaty.

### CAUGHT BY PIRATES BETWEEN THE 'EATS'

Chicago Guests Saved From Walking Plank at Novel Entertainment

STAMFORD, Conn., Sept. 14.—Thomas L. Robins, member of the United States Naval Consulting Board and president of the Robins Conveying Belt Company, entertained 125 members of his New York and Chicago office force here at Saddle Rock, his country place, and at the Stamford Yacht Club.

The entertainment began with luncheon at the Yacht Club. In the midst of it, a band of armed pirates appeared and forced ten of the Chicago men to leave the club house and march, hands in the air, to a boat flying the black flag, with white skull and crossbones at its masthead. 
