

FARMERS URGE O. K. OF EQUAL SUFFRAGE

Demand Packer Regulation and Right to Bargain Collectively.

The national board of farm organizations yesterday afternoon favored the immediate ratification of the equal suffrage amendment to the constitution and demanded the right of collective bargaining by farmers and the regulation of the packer industry.

Among the Senators who pledged their support to the farmers in their fight for the right of collective bargaining, are Hoke Smith of Georgia, Underwood of Alabama, Wadsworth of New York, Sterling of South Dakota, Kenyon of Iowa, Curtis of Kansas, and Swanson of Virginia. These declared themselves during the conference.

Senator Capper of Kansas delivered a speech in defense of the Capper-Hereman bill, which specifically allows, within certain limits, collective bargaining among farmers. Under this bill, Senator Capper said, cooperative buying and selling agencies could be established and as long as the farmers made legitimate use of these channels through which to do their buying and selling they could not be molested by the authorities.

The Kansas statesman declared that the agriculturists had not been given a fair deal. Unwillingly, or otherwise, they had been treated in many cases as enemies of their country, he declared, and there was an effort even now to saddle them with the responsibility for the high cost of living. "Farmers are in no sense responsible for the high cost of living," Senator Capper declared.

BRITISH CABINET CRISIS IS DENIED

LONDON, Sept. 18.—Rumors of a pending ministerial crisis were gladdened today by the Parliamentary lobbyist correspondent of the Daily News.

"There is no sign of any intention or desire in Government circles to go before the people in a general election, and there is only the smallest support of the suggestion that the cabinet be reconstructed," said the Daily News. The newspaper says that the report that Sir Auckland Geddes has resigned as minister of national service and reconstruction is incorrect.

Persistent Rumor Tells of Assassination—Censorship Balks Confirmation.

SANTIAGO, Chile, Sept. 18.—It is persistently rumored here that President Augusto B. Leguia, of Peru, was assassinated last Tuesday. The foreign minister has received dispatches from Iquique saying that there the rumor is believed to be true.

All communication with Peru is under censorship, and confirmation of the rumor is impossible at present.

BURCH IS ELECTED NEW YORK BISHOP

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—The Rt. Rev. Charles Sumner Burch, suffragan bishop of the New York diocese of the Protestant Episcopal Church, was elected bishop of New York on the third ballot at a special diocesan convention yesterday.

He succeeds the late Bishop David H. Greer. On the final ballot Bishop Burch received 128 clerical votes and eighty-six and one-half lay votes, as against his closest competitor, the Rev. Dr. Ernest Milnor Stires, rector of St. Thomas' Church, who had fifty-five clerical votes and twenty-eight and one-half lay votes.

POSTPONE DATE OF PRESS CLUB SHOW

IN respect to the memory of Ben F. Allen, correspondent of the Cleveland Plain Dealer, who was killed in an automobile accident near Portland, Ore., last Monday, the opening entertainment of the National Press Club's 1919-1920 season, which was to have been held tomorrow evening, has been postponed until Friday evening, September 26.

"We Used to Be Newspaper Men Ourselves—From Copy Boy to Congress," will be the subject of the entertainment. The list of speakers includes Senators Capper and McCormick and Congressmen Fitzgerald, Greene, Hardy, Gallivan, and Platt, and William Colver and Victor Murgdock, of the Federal Trade Commission.

MAJOR SCHROEDER ARMY'S 'HIGHER FLYER'

America's champion "high flyer" is Major R. W. Schroeder, McCook Field, Dayton, Ohio. Major Schroeder holds the altitude records for both pilot alone and for pilot and passenger.

On September 6 Major Schroeder, carrying a passenger in his LaPere biplane, attained a true height of 28,286 feet above sea level. His altitude was originally announced as 28,300 feet, but when the proper corrections were applied to his instruments it was found that his actual record was 1,000 feet less than that figure.

This mark beats the former two-man altitude record held by Captain Lang, of the Royal Air Force, who ascended 27,500 feet on June 2, 1915.

Major Schroeder is also holder of the one-man record, of 28,900 feet, made with a Bristol biplane equipped with Hispano-Suiza motor at Wilbur Wright Field, September 18, 1918.

Several times since then it has been reported that the record had been beaten, but each time, after the proper corrections had been applied to the pilot's instruments, it was found that Major Schroeder still retained the record.

On January 2 it was reported that Captain Lang had reached an altitude of 30,500 feet, but corrections proved his record to have been 27,500, or 1,000 less than Major Schroeder's record.

It was recently reported that Roland Robbs had reached 31,000 feet in a Curtiss Wasp triplane, but this is unofficial and is believed to have been less than 28,000 feet.

No official figures have been published regarding the reported record climb of Adolphe Caudin in France last June. There is a possibility that Major Schroeder's figures have been surpassed by the French flyer.

U. S. DELEGATES SAIL FOR CHURCH CONGRESS
