CAPT. J. P. MEGREW DIES AT HOME HERE

Capt. John P. Megrew, civil war veteran and former captain of the United States Capitol police, died yesterday at his home, 1345 Perry place northwest.

Capt. Megrew was born eighty-one years ago at Ashlon, Ohio, where he spent the first years of his life. When the civil war broke out he enlisted in the Eleventh Indiana volunteers and served throughout the war with distinction. He was twice wounded while at the head of his company, and had been through much of the hottest fighting of the war. After the war he served as provost marshal of Fort McHenry.

He was appointed captain of the Capitol police through the efforts of friends in Washington official circles, and served until about eight years ago, when he retired.

Captain Megrew was a personal friend of Gen. Lew Wallace, under whose command he had served during the war.

He is survived by his widow and son, George W. Megrew, of Chicago. Funeral services will be held from his home at 1 o'clock tomorrow afternoon under the auspices of the G. A. R. and the Loyal Legion.

Interment, with full military honors will be in the national cemetery at Arlington tomorrow afternoon.

MRS. ELEANOR OLIVER.

Mrs. Eleanor McMillin Oliver, wife of Joseph D. Oliver, Jr., and only daughter of Benton McMillin, ex-governor of Tennessee, Congressman, and minister to France, died last night in Philadelphia, according to word received here.

Death resulted from injuries received when she was thrown from her horse in Rock Creek Park last October. Following the accident she was treated in Emergency Hospital for six months before recovering sufficiently to be moved.

Mrs. Oliver, who was only twenty years old, was widely known in Capital society. Her father served three terms in Congress, resigning in 1899 to take the governorship of Tennessee. He was notified short time ago that his daughter's condition was serious, and took the first boat for New York, but was unable to reach her before the end.

BARS TO PASSPORTS DROPPED BY EUROPE

Great Britain Now the Only Country To Restrict Travel.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—Passport applications will be received at the local office of the passport bureau from persons who desire to visit Europe for purposes of travel and recreation. Passports for this purpose will be issued after October 1, it was said yesterday, to all European countries with the exception of England.

Travelers to that country must still be able to convince the Department of State that their visit is necessary for pressing business or family reasons, but the desire of Americans to see the battlefields of France, Flanders, and Italy may be gratified at once if they can obtain steamer accommodations. No reason has been given for the continued prohibition on travel to Great Britain, but it was intimated that the English government does not desire an influx of travelers until the food and labor situation in that country is somewhat eased. Ireland is not included in the prohibition against visiting Great Britain.

CAILLAUX ACCUSED.

PARIS, Sept. 18.—The commission of the court, sitting as a tribunal of accusation, has ordered Joseph Caillaux, former premier of France, to face charges of intriguing to bring about a premature peace with Germany. The justice Louis Loustalot and Paul Comby, who were held in connection with the Caillaux case.

LLOYD GEORGE TO VISIT U. S. LONDON, Sept. 18.—Thomas Howell, Canadian national secretary of the International Brotherhood, announced at the City Temple that Premier Lloyd George is going to visit America soon.


