The bill provides that a clause which would prohibit any member of the police force from being a member of an organization, affiliated with a labor organization. The new bill makes a radical change in the probationary period of privates. At the present time a man must be on the force eight years before he can be eligible to class three.

CIVIL SERVICE JOBS TESTS ANNOUNCED

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced competitive examinations for several positions left open through vacancies or increased appropriation. The jobs range from plant engineer, at a salary of \$5,000 a year, to a solar radiation assistant, Weather Bureau, at a yearly salary of \$1,000 to \$1,200.
