NEXT ON THE LIST, THE PURPLE COW

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 9.—Gelett Burgess' statement: "I never saw a purple cow" will soon be trembling for its verity. Just as soon as some billionaire ranch owner calls on a Frisco interior decorator to design him something soulful and artistic in a model dairy interior, I feel sure old Bossy will be seized upon without a speck of compunction and tinted up to match the prevailing color scheme. At present, the artists seem to be confining their artistic efforts to the vegetable kingdom, but it is only a question of days and inspiration when nature's tints on fish, flesh and fowl will be touched up to meet the requirements of 1919 interior decoration.

What they have done already to the lilies of the pond, the thistles of the field and the cattails of the swamp is a riot in color combinations. It is just human nature to be surprised with a bounteous supply of anything, and therefore to try and change, improve upon or make it different. For this reason, it isn't a bit odd to find California, that paradise of flowers, the habitat of the new-uncanny dried and colorfully tinted floral tributes that catch the startled eye in the fascinating art shops of San Francisco.

Japanese Lotus.
 The Japanese lotus lends itself most beautifully to this ultra treatment, and, after the drying process, which keeps the buds and seed pods intact and the leaves in artistically curled-up postures, oil paint, in two tone combinations, turquoise and mauve, orange, and smoke blue, gray and temple red are applied over their entire surface at the discretion of the artist. The finished effect, though a bit weird, is really, mighty decorative and attractive. It is a pity the lotus flower also cannot be dried intact, but it is too fragile to survive the ordeal. Two buds, two leaves and two seed pods make up each order, and they can be done in any two tints, that the purchaser desires.

The cattails and thistles are treated in a similar manner. Aside from painting the lily and gliding the rose, other freak vegetable matter au naturel is resorted to for unusual decorative effects. The budding blossom of the date palm, which is like a branch of exquisitely pink coral dotted with tiny oval brown nodules, has a fantastic and beautiful effect in a shallow bowl of bronze or iridescent glass. Sprays of scarlet and orange peppers, not from the graceful pepper

NO WET SPELL UNTIL 90,000 LEAVE ARMY

The demobilization of the army will not be completed before October 31, or until approximately 90,000 officers and men yet to be discharged are released, according to information given out at the War Department today. It had been assumed in some quarters that the recent statement of the Secretary of War meant that the army was on a peace basis; that is, upon the basis of strength provided by law. But it is the understanding of Mr. Baker's statement, it was a misapprehension of the facts as made public by the department today.

If peace were to come tomorrow and ratifications should be exchanged the day after, it still would be necessary for the final process of demobilization to be gone through with before the wartime liquor ban could be lifted. The statement of the War Department bearing upon this subject, in part, follows:

322,450 Still in Army.
 "The operations division of the General Staff has furnished statistics which show that the total number of men in the army on September 29, 1919, was 322,450. The maximum estimate of the strength of the army on October 31, 1919, is given as 252,905, leaving 79,599 men to be discharged by that date.
 "On September 16, 1919, it was shown that there were 31,825 commissioned officers in the active service, 9,146 of whom are regulars and 22,579 temporary. Inasmuch as recent legislation enacted by Congress stipulated that the total commissioned strength of the army shall at no time during the fiscal year 1920 exceed 18,000 it is obviously necessary that 13,825 of these emergency officers be returned to civil life by October 31, 1919.

"This means that it will be necessary for over 90,000 individuals to find employment in civil life. When Col. Arthur Woods, formerly assistant to the Secretary of War, in charge of soldier employment, left the War Department he stated that a careful study of the reports and available statistics showed that about 80 per cent of the men released from service were taken back in their old jobs, or better ones, by their former employers. This being true, it is anticipated that this office will have another 20,000 men added to those now on its lists as needing employment. Among these men, especially the officers, will be found executives and technically trained men of all the professions and trades. Because of their previous training and their long experience gained in the army, these soldiers are among the best to be discharged.

Doesn't Want Fable to Forget.
 "The attention of the public is invited, not because the soldier is being forgotten when the soldier is disappearing from the public eye, but because the impression must not go out that every discharged service man has a satisfactory job. These men who are now being released have been held for the convenience of the Government, and many have been working day and night in order that their more fortunate comrades might be discharged and returned to civil pursuits.
 "They are coming home now one by one, unheralded, and it is hoped that the people at home will remember that these men have had unusually long service and are now coming back to take up again their livelihood where they left off. Experience in the past has shown that employers, and, in fact, everyone, has been more than willing to extend a helping hand to all men who have worn the uniform of the army or navy."

POSSE IN FULL CRY AFTER GEORGIA PAIR

MACON, Ga., Oct. 9.—Trapped in a large tract near Macon, a man and a woman, both white, today are facing capture and impending killing. A J. Elkin, a Ribb county farmer, and attacking his brother-in-law, Tom Sawyer, on a country road near this city, Sawyer is in a serious condition.

Hundreds of persons, headed by Sheriff Hicks and his deputies, are engaged in the hunt, and feeling is running high. This section has seen three lynchings, all of negroes, however, within the past week.

Elkin and Sawyer were in separate wagons en route home from Macon late yesterday. Three miles out on the Columbus road the man and woman, who were walking, asked them for a ride. Elkin made room for the man and Sawyer gave half of his seat to the woman.

Nine miles out, the man struck Elkin over the head with a hammer. At the same instant the woman struck Sawyer over the head with another hammer. Elkin is believed to have been killed instantly.

WILL KILL 10 REDS FOR EACH ONE SLAIN

LONDON, Oct. 9.—The counter revolution against the Bolsheviks in Russia is extending, said an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Helsinki today, quoting advices that had been received there from Moscow.

The Mencheviki, who are leading the movement, declare that the lives of ten reds must be forfeited for every Socialist Revolutionary who has been killed, according to a dispatch from the Morning Post.

The Bolsheviks in Petrograd have arrested Prof. Grimm and Prof. Olenberg, two of the best known educators in Russia, and their fate is unknown. Both were opposing the red doctrine of government. Feeling against the radicals has been growing steadily. Sixteen attempts were made to assassinate prominent Bolshevik leaders in Moscow during the past week, it was reported from Helsinki.

In addition to Jacob Peters, former head of the secret police system of Lenin and Trotsky, his assistant, Koltchakoff, has been assassinated, it is reported.
