

CONFER HONOR ON FAMOUS SCIENTIST

Dr. James Harris Rogers, the eminent scientist of Hyattsville, Prince George's county, Md., discoverer of the Rogers underground and underwater wireless telegraph system, had the distinction last night of having the "inventor's medal" conferred upon him by the Maryland Academy of Sciences at Baltimore.

Dr. Francis C. Nicholas, curator and director of the Academy presented the medal to the Maryland scientist in the presence of a representative gathering of friends, members of the academy and many professional and scientific men.

On the obverse side of the medal bears the inscription: "Maryland Academy of Science, 1797-1919. For invention and patriotism. The words enuncia the insignia of the academy upon a many pointed star. On the reverse side is inscribed: "To Dr. J. Harris Rogers, inventor of underground wireless telegraphy, American patriot of the world war. An expression of public gratitude, 1914-1918." A reception followed the ceremonies when the guests and members of the academy had the opportunity to meet the distinguished scientist.

Worked in a Shack.

The undersea experiments of Dr. Rogers were conducted mainly at Piney Point, a post hamlet of St. Mary's county, situated on the east side of the Potomac river. Dr. Rogers conducted his scientific work below a little shack. To reach his laboratory it was necessary to go down a stairway. His sister, Miss A. Mae Rogers lived with the scientist at a bungalow near by. It was in the laboratory under this shack that one of America's greatest inventions was perfected.

Congress, it is expected, will soon confer a gold medal for distinguished service, a resolution urging recognition of Dr. Rogers having been introduced by Senator France of Maryland.

Degree From Georgetown.

Georgetown University has bestowed upon the inventor the degree of doctor of sciences, the Maryland State College of Agriculture has also honored him and, upon the occasion of the welcoming home of the Hyattsville war veterans, the city authorities passed resolutions of appreciation of Dr. Rogers, in which was said: "His kindness, thoughtfulness and gentle courtesy had endeared him to us long before his epoch-making discovery. When our country was in peril he worked ceaselessly in his laboratory, and when means of communicating quickly with our forces upon the sea and in France became imperative he had perfected his discoveries and turned over to a grateful nation his underground wireless and undersea methods of communications. We can only sense the value to mankind of these inventions; posterity must do them justice." The resolutions were signed by Mayor M. F. Holloran, the common council and citizens of Hyattsville, and were presented to the inventor at his home.

VICTOR MURDOCK TO ADDRESS CLUB

Victor Murdock, of the Federal Trade Commission, will be the principal speaker at a meeting of the Twentieth Century Club in the Cosmos Club on Thursday. He will tell of the relation of food, clothing, and shelter as they apply to the problem of the high cost of living. The meeting will be held at 12 o'clock.

Frank Ansel, Belgian poet, one of the members of the king's party in his tour of the Red Cross, was a guest at the home of Mrs. John J. Van Schaek, leader of the French section of the Twentieth Century Club, at her home in Massachusetts avenue northwest Thursday afternoon last. Mr. Ansel was a friend of Mrs. Van Schaek's before he came to Washington, having been connected with her in Belgian relief work during the war. He made a short address to the members of the club assembled to meet him.

Volunteers from the Twentieth Century Club will be asked to carry on work of the Red Cross next Thursday. In line with the Red Cross campaign, Mrs. Theodore Lee Cole, chairman of the educational section of the club, will outline a campaign for Americanization by members of the club. Each club member will be asked to effect the Americanization of at least one resident of Washington.

REFUSED TO PART WITH DOG, PINCHED

LA GRANDE, Ore., Nov. 1.—A woman's love for her dog has led to the arrest here of Mrs. E. W. McCarthy for alleged complicity in a bank robbery.

The police tracked her spotted dog to this city and arrested the trio. It was said that the men urged her to part with the dog in Utah, but she refused.
