## D. C. EMPLOYERS PROVE PATRIOTIC

Well Represented in Citations For Giving Jobs Back to Yanks.

Armistice Day, the date set by Maj. Gen. William G. Haan, Assistant Chief of Staff, and in charge of soldier employment activities, as the final date for applications for the citations, issued jointly by the War and Navy Departments to all employers who have taken back or stand ready to take back their service men, found the city of Washington well to the front in the "Legion of Patriotic Employers."

This plan for a legion of patriotic employers was devised in the office of the Assistant to the Secretary of War. All that was necessary to do to become a member of this legion was for an employer to assure the War and Navy Departments that he would gladly re-employ all men formerly with him who left to serve in the army or navy during the world war. As a mark of esteem the Government awarded to all such employers the official citation, in the form of a certificate, signed by the Secretaries of War and Navy.

## PRESS CONGRESS TO RETURN HERO DEAD

Representatives of League To Bring Back Bodies Appeal to House.

The Bring Home the Soldier Dead League of Pittsburgh (this morning made a plea and a demand of the House Foreign Affairs Committee for definite action on the part of Congress and by other Federal authorities for the return to this country of the bodies of American soldiers who were killed or died in France.

Representatives of the league took the position that "everyone wants these bodies returned. They do not care how they are returned, but they want the bodies brought back." The demand was supported by members of Congress from various States.

Officials of the War Department have sought to check the growth of this agitation throughout the country. They have argued that it would be better to permit the bodies to remain in France, where they will be placed in national cemeteries to be cared for and protected under the French laws by patriotic French people.

Besides backing this course with sentimental reasoning, it has been urged that the practical side of the argument in favor of keeping the bodies in France is compelling. The effect on the French people, and even on the American people, of the long death trains and solemn cortege would be most distressing and depressing. It is admitted that in the rush of burial of the dead following battle there was confusion and some mistakes in identification of bodies may have happened. As a result assurances may be impossible that the bodies in all cases are those as represented.

But the pressure is so strong on Congress for the return of the soldier dead that the committee may be forced to act favorably on the legislation desired at an early date.

She will arrive November 27, in time to arrange for the funeral of the former ambassador, whose body, in accordance with arrangements by the State Department, will arrive in Naples on U. S. S. North Dakota on December 4.
