WOMAN FINDS NEW STAR IN MILKY WAY PHOTOS

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Jan. 8.—Another star has been discovered by the Harvard College Observatory. Miss Joanna C. S. Mackie, of the observatory staff, in the course of an examination of photographs of the milky way, taken recently at Cambridge, has detected the newcooper. Its position is right ascension 18 hours, 49 minutes, 30 seconds; declination plus 29 degrees, 6.3 minutes (1900). It is far too faint to be seen with the naked eye.

The discovery is the thirty-fifth of its kind in the history of astronomy and the nineteenth to the credit of the Harvard College.
