Minister of Foreign Affairs of Uruguay Arrives—Mrs. Marshall Luncheon Guest—Important Dinner Parties

DR. JUAN ANTONIO BUERA, minister of foreign affairs of Uruguay, and Mme. Buera, who will arrive in Washington this afternoon to be the guests of the nation for a few days, will stay at the New Willard. They are on their way back to Uruguay from Paris. Mme. Buero is a daughter of the President of Uruguay.
