GLASS SAYS U. S. IS THROUGH LENDING

Opposes Conference to Consider Ways and Means of Restoring Europe.

The United States has virtually served notice on foreign countries that it is through with money lending, except in cases where starvation is threatened, was the belief here today, following the publication of a letter by Secretary of Treasury Glass to Homer L. Ferguson, president of the United States Chamber of Commerce. Glass' letter was written in answer to a memorandum, signed by forty-four prominent business men, recommending an international financial conference to consider ways and means to restore Europe.

Glass placed himself on record against the proposed conference, declaring that it would only "cause confusion and revive hopes, doomed to disappointment, of further Government loans."

The Government, he said, is opposed to further control over foreign trade and finance. Restoration of Europe, he said, must come through private channels. Cancellation of debts owed the United States by foreign countries, Glass indicated, is impossible. Memoranda sent out by European financiers, he said, suggested the debts, or part of them, be canceled. Europe's problems, he said, should be solved by its own activities.

"Relief would be found in disarmament, resumption of industrial life and activity, and the imposition of adequate taxes and the issue of adequate domestic loans," Glass said.

GLASS WOULD CUT FOOD LOAN BY \$25,000,000

Minimum Needed for Relief Work is \$125,000,000, He Tells House.

The minimum loan needed for food relief work in Poland, Austria and Armenia is \$125,000,000, Secretary of the Treasury Glass told the House Ways and Means Committee yesterday. President Woodrow Wilson, he said, is asking Congress to make this loan. Glass stated that after a conference with Herbert Hoover, and due to the fact that Great Britain, Canada, and Argentina, had agreed to help, it was determined that the amount necessary could be reduced from \$120,000,000 to \$125,000,000. Suggestions of committee members that the loan be reduced to \$50,000,000 would merely lead to wasting the money, Glass declared, because it would be insufficient to better the situation.

Men, women and children are literally dying by the thousands, and the need for prompt action is imperative, Glass said.

EX-KAISER HOPED TO OPEN OFFICE IN WALL STREET

Wilhelm Planned Spectacular Flight Here to Become American Citizen.

PARIS, Jan. 30.—How the former Kaiser planned a sensational gallery play by casting himself upon the mercy of the American Government and people, where, after he intended to take out American citizenship papers and open an office in Wall Street, and, backed by the German crown treasure, become a captain of industry, was revealed today by a prominent Dutch source.

Misinformation by his Dutch advisers, who hoped this rid Holland of the embarrassing guest, William Hohenzollern worked out an intricate scheme whereby he expected to gain his liberty under the protection of the American flag.

Immediately following the signature of the Versailles treaty, he planned to flee from Holland secretly aboard a yacht, the purchase of which he had already negotiated through a trusted friend in Norway.

Once within the three-mile limit of the United States, the imperial ensign was to be hoisted and he would give himself up to the American naval authorities at Hampton Roads, meanwhile, making a wireless proclamation pleading for an immediate audience at the White House, appealing to the charity and sportsmanship of the American people, and asking that a special act of Congress be passed making him a citizen in consideration of his renunciation of all claims to throne and royalty.

This coup was to have been staged early last July, but Wilhelm's secret emissaries in America, who felt the ground there early in 1919, reported unfavorably.

ARMY SERVICE CORPS HOLDS REUNION DINNER

A reunion dinner for officers who served in the army service corps during the war was held Wednesday night at the University Club. Plans for a permanent organization were discussed.

Capt. Daniel T. O'Connell presided, and voiced the ideal of the organization as 100 per cent Americanism. Major A. A. Hoehling, who organized the corps from men drawn from all over the country, told of its early history.

A committee was appointed to arrange for a reunion in this city of the entire membership in the latter part of March.


