Health Boards Give Warning of Influenza Danger

LEGIONERS ELECT 3 VICE COMMANDERS

Delegates From All District Posts Adopt New Constitution.

Three vice commanders were elected last night at the convention of the American Legion, held in the District Building. Seventy-two delegates and thirty-eight alternates, representing all the posts in Washington, were present and several discussions of importance caused the meeting to last four and one-half hours.

The convention was called for the purpose of ratifying the constitution of the American Legion for the District of Columbia and electing three vice commanders. The constitution provides for one new vice commander, not more than two of whom can be from the army.

James A. Drain, delegate from the National Press Club Post, was unanimously elected first vice commander. James P. Rollins of Henry C. Spangler Post was the only other nominee for this office, but he withdrew in favor of Mr. Drain. Miss Alice P. Harvey, delegate from Jane A. Delano Post, No. 8, was elected second vice commander, and Harry J. Davis of Robley D. Evans Post, No. 4, was elected third vice commander.

Fears of Too Much Power. Fears of the delegates that too much power was vested in the delegates by the constitution was the chief cause for lengthy discussions.

The constitution was read by John Lewis Smith, chairman; Henry Leonard and Department Commander E. Lester Jones, and as each paragraph was read it was amended according to the votes of the delegates. When the amendments were completed the constitution was voted on and adopted.

Ten delegates from Walter Reed Hospital were present at the convention, which was the second one held in the District of Columbia. The meeting was presided over by Department Commander E. Lester Jones.

Women Plan to Have Their Own Political Party in 1920 Fight

By MILDRED MORRIS. (L. N. S.) A woman's party will be in the field after the ratification of the suffrage amendment, feminists here announced today.

Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont and Charlotte Perkins Gilman are among the foremost leaders urging it. Leaders known as "extreme feminists," strongly advocated that the new party stand for "women only" as political candidates. They are in favor of placing women candidates in the field for every office from President down.

Differences in opinion on this subject will be threshed out, at the convention of the National Woman's Party, the militants' organization, next June when plans for the new party will be formally launched.

At this meeting it will be decided whether to disband the National Woman's Party which was organized for the sole purpose of obtaining equal suffrage or to continue it as a "self-conscious" and active force in politics.

Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont is a member of the national executive committee of the party. Alice Paul, its chairman, says she is waiting for the June convention to express her views.

The feminists whose slogan is "We are for women only," and predict that sex war must be urged to get justice for their sex, say they will start a party of their own if Mrs. Belmont's and Mrs. Gilman's views prevail.

They say they may get into action before the suffrage amendment is ratified and nominate a national ticket of women candidates to put before the women voters in November.

Charlotte Perkins Gilman declares against "sex antagonism" in an article in the current issue of the "Suffragist," the official organ of the National suffrage party.

"The whole movement called Feminism is of value insofar as it helps humanity. Women are not a separate race," she says.

"The special effort of the National Woman's Party for the moment is to promote the work of ratification of the Federal amendment so long striven for."

They are thereby all the readier to take hold of results now that sex restrictions are removed from political action. Women need no longer petition men to do things for them nor blame men for conditions they do not approve.

It would be well indeed for our country if the Women's Party were to grow strong in every State to offer a minimum program to have all its members which they could further through any existing party.

"If it should set up a separate machine with platform and candidates it would meet the same difficulty which so weakens the Socialist party, namely the increasing withdrawal of voters from any effective action until such time as they become a majority."

JACK FROST HELPS POLICE CAPTURE STRAY PRISONER

Edgar Primrose, colored, who with thirteen other prisoners escaped from "the farm" at Lorton, Va., several days ago, was arrested last night in a house at Logan court.

Five of the men who escaped were members of the Pierce street "gang" which worked in the vicinity of the Washington Terminal yard. They were arrested on a charge of shooting up Pierce street northwest, as the climax of a bootlegging raid.

Primrose, who was sentenced to serve a term of five years, had planned to go from this city to Pittsburgh, but as a result of having his feet frostbitten while lurking in the woods near Lorton after his escape, was unable to carry out his plans.

CUMMINGS SCORES G.O.P. RECORD IN CONGRESS

Democratic Chairman Declares People Have Paid Staggering Price for Choosing.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—That the American people have paid and are still paying a staggering cost for having elected a Republican Congress, and that this Congress has failed in every attempt to settle post-war industrial, financial and social problems, was the charge made here last night by Chairman Homer S. Cummings, of the Democratic national committee, at a dinner in the honor of Secretary of the Navy Daniels, in a speech, arraigned the Republicans for appealing "to hypochondriacs," and predicted defeat for their party next November.

An appeal has been made to Major Daniel Donovan, auditor of the District, who is head of one of the big circus committees; and it is expected that when the animals arrive, there will be homes awaiting them.

Every boy and girl at the afternoon performances will get a free ride on a pony.

CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL DRIVE NEARS \$75,000

The perseverance of workers in the drive for \$100,000 for Children's Hospital, which was started over two months ago, is slowly claiming its reward. Nearly \$75,000 has been raised for the fund to improve the buildings and equipment of the institution.

Among other contributions recently received are those of Gen. Maxwell Woodhull, \$200; Twentieth Century Club, \$52.29; George R. Linkins, \$25; Societa Unione E. Tratlonna, \$25; L. B. Pool, \$15; and the Epworth League, Asbury Church, \$10.

VIOLENT RADICALS RAMPANT, HE SAYS

Attorney General of New York Urges Passage of Sedition Bills.

"Tens of thousands of radicals of the violent type daily are advocating overthrow of the Government and establishment of a dictatorship, such as exists in Russia," Attorney General Newton, of New York, declared today before the House Judiciary Committee in urging the passage by Congress of sedition legislation.

Newton attacked the left wing of the Socialist party, the I. W. W., the Communists, and other kindred organizations.

"The efforts of these violent radicals are encouraged, and the aim they are pledged to accomplish are boldly set forth and glorified by a press equally as radical and violent as the advocates of revolution themselves," he said.

Newton charged that the left wing of the Socialist party, in a manifesto published last July, declared for the repudiation of all national debts.

"This means an advocacy of the repudiation of all Liberty bonds and other Government obligations held by patriotic citizens who loaned the Government billions in the time for war. Unless Congress and the people of the country awaken to the danger of these doctrines and take steps to curb this propaganda, the problem of coping with this movement will become more difficult as time elapses."
