

**THREE G. W. U. MEN WIN HIGHEST SCHOOL HONOR**

J. P. Earnest, Jr., J. W. Townsend and Solomon Shappirio Elected Senior Marshals.

John Paul Earnest, Jr., Jonathan W. Townsend, and Solomon Shappirio have been elected senior marshals to officiate at commencement week events at George Washington University in June. The honor is considered one of the greatest that can be conferred upon seniors at the institution.

Earnest, who is enrolled in Columbian College, is taking the combined course leading to the degree of bachelor of arts and doctor of medicine, and he will receive the former degree at the June commencement. He is president of the freshman medical class, a member of the staff of the Hatchet, weekly student paper, and a member of the university's student council.

Townsend, a senior at the law school, is a member of the Hatchet staff and an active worker in Phi Delta Phi legal fraternity. Shappirio, also a law school senior,

is a member of the Pyramid Honor Society and president of the student council on which he has served for three years.

**WISCONSIN BREWERIES WILL MAKE 2.50 BEER**

MILWAUKEE, March 3.—Reincarnation of Wisconsin breweries waited today on ratification of the peace treaty by the United States Senate, following Federal Judge Geiger's decision that the Mulberger State law, legalizing 2.5 per cent beer, is constitutional.

The law provides that manufacture and sale of 2.5 per cent beer is allowable after the treaty of peace has been ratified.

H. A. Sawyer, Federal district attorney, announced that he would seek permission of Attorney General Palmer to appeal directly to the Federal Supreme Court for review of the Geiger decision.

**PLANS TO DEVELOP WEALTH OF ALASKA**

Congressman Curry Introduces Bill Designed to Promote Prosperity of Country.

Alaska, often called the national warehouse, could be made a source of wealth and prosperity not only to the residents of the Territory, but to the United States in general under a broad, comprehensive and sympathetic policy, today declared Congressman Curry of California, chairman of the House Territories Committee, who has introduced a bill reorganizing the methods of administering laws regulating the development of the country.

**Must Amend Laws.**

"We have got to amend our laws so far as they apply to Alaska, so as to make it possible for a man to go to Alaska with opportunity of bettering his condition," said Mr. Curry. There is no reason for a man to leave civilization and go to Alaska when he can make more money in San Francisco or New York. I am going to present measures that will permit the private development of Alaska.

The land area of Alaska, continued Mr. Curry, is 378,105,760 acres. The climate in portions of southeastern Alaska is more temperate and more equitable than that of Washington, while much of the northern portion has a milder climate than Stockholm or Petrograd.

Large areas in the interior valleys have fertile soil, and will produce cereals, vegetables, berries and hay. Enormous deposits of gold, copper, coal, and other minerals have been discovered, and the unexplored areas will be found probably to contain other great deposits. Yet the population is less than 65,000 white inhabitants.

**Needs Development.**

"There is but one railroad of any length or importance in full operation," said Mr. Curry, "and that is a private road built primarily for the purpose of reaching and developing mineral properties held by the owners of the road. There are safe harbors and feasible passes for terminal facilities and for pushing transportation lines from the coast to the great valleys of the interior."

"There may be mentioned four primary reasons which, under existing laws and conditions, prevent the proper development of Alaska and her resources: Lack of transportation facilities, lack of available fuel, lack of laws especially adapted to the peculiar conditions and public resources of Alaska.

Difficulty of administering laws and expeditiously transacting business with present facilities because of the difficulty of communication with Washington, and because of the fact that most of the men who administer the laws have a very limited knowledge of the territory.

**Saving in Time.**

"The distance from Washington to Sitka is 4,000 miles; to Fairbanks, 4,700 miles; to Nome, 5,400 miles. Journeys into the interior, with rare exceptions, must be made on foot or with a dog team. Long winters and heavy snows constitute obstacles of serious import.

"The disposition and administration of natural resources directly by a resident commission would effect an enormous saving in time and money to those citizens having to deal with public lands and resources and would remove the repeated complaints of delay. Long-range Government has never been a success anywhere; Alaska is no exception.

So small an area of the public lands and so few of the natural resources of Alaska have been disposed of that the Territory constitutes a virgin field for trial of new and improved laws and regulations governing such disposition and use.

There are not present the vested and conflicting interest the long practice, and the many possessory rights which exist in the public lands of the United States proper, and which offer a barrier to change in law, administration and procedure."

**BRIDES-TO-BE LEARNING ENGLISH TO BE MARRIED**

Twelve Italian Girls Held at Ellis Island Until They Master Forty Words.

NEW YORK, March 3.—Twelve Italian girls who came to the United States to marry American soldiers, but who have been held at Ellis Island because they could not pass the literary test, learned today Washington had ruled they may be admitted for sixty days provided they sign a pledge not to marry during that time.

If Senator Calder's bill to exempt them from the test is passed, they may be permitted to marry their soldier lovers. Even if the bill fails to become a law, there is a chance for the girls, for during the sixty days they may learn to read the required forty words and return to Ellis Island to demonstrate their accomplishment.

Each soldier must get a friend or relative to furnish a \$500 bond to guarantee that his prospective bride will not become a public charge. The news spread so rapidly and the dough-

boy romances acted so promptly that it was said at Ellis Island four or five of the girls probably would gain their freedom tomorrow, despite the fact that some of the men are in distant cities. Every man has expressed his determination to send his "girl" to school—day, night, or both—until she can read.

**COTHRONS' KIDNAPING CASE POSTPONED WEEK**

BALTIMORE, March 3.—The indictment charging Clarence Cothron and his wife, Grace Cothron, with kidnaping Little Mamie Groscup on July 7, last, during their flight to Florida, was assigned for trial in criminal court yesterday, but was postponed until next Monday at the request of Mrs. Cothron's counsel, State Senator Crothers.

Cothron and his wife were tried at Belair for the murder of one of the chauffeurs in Cecil county. He was convicted and sentenced to imprisonment for life, but Mrs. Cothron was acquitted. The other alleged murder was committed in Montgomery county.

Mrs. Cothron has been in the city jail since her acquittal.

**LABOR OUTLOOK GOOD, SAYS RESERVE BOARD**

Occupies More Stable Position Now Than at Any Time in History.

Labor occupies a more stable position now than at any other period in the country's history. The Federal Reserve Board thus summed up today employment conditions in various industries. Labor is satisfied and prosperous, the board stated. Labor's outlook, from close study of industrial conditions, is exceptionally good, it was declared. Unfavorable aspects only are found in the tendency toward restriction of output by industries in some districts. But even these are not believed to presage any cutting down of working forces.

A scarcity of labor exists in many reserve districts. This is particularly true in the agricultural sections. The farm labor shortage in the Southwest is acute.

Largely increased forces of men are being employed in the eastern districts. Factories are reported to be increasing toward capacity production.

with increasing demand for more skilled labor. In some industries highly specialized, a scarcity of raw material has led to restricted output, but this interference has not reacted seriously upon labor, which continues in steady demand.

**NOVENA OF GRACE TO BEGIN AT ST. ALOYSIUS'**

Relief of St. Francis Will Be Exposed During Nine-Day Church Services.

A novena of grace in honor of St. Francis Xavier will begin in St. Aloysius Church, North Capitol and I streets tomorrow morning and will continue nine days, ending the evening of Friday, March 12. An attendance of 15,000 men and women at the daily exercises is expected.

Rev. Paul R. Conniff, S. J., rector of St. Aloysius', last night announced that the services of the novena will be repeated at eight different periods each day, and that both the main church, which accommodates 2,000 persons, and the basement church, which accommodates 1,500, will be used in order to enable all who make the annual novena to gain admittance.

The daily program is as follows: Rev. William J. Brooks, S. J., will conduct the exercises and give a five-minute talk at the 8:30 a. m. children's mass, and exercises at 12:05 p. m. in the basement of the church at 7 a. m. mass and novena exercises will be held; at 5 p. m. in the main church, Rev. J. Charles Davey, S. J., will conduct the exercises and deliver the sermon and at the same hour in the basement of the church Rev. Paul R. Conniff, S. J., will conduct the exercises and preach; at 7:30 p. m. Rev. Edward J. Sweeney, S. J., will preach the sermon and conduct the exercises in the main church; while in the basement, at the same time, Rev. George E. Kelley, S. J., will do likewise; Rev. Joseph I. Fink, S. J., will conduct the exercises and preach the sermon in the main church at 8:15 p. m.

A relic of the arm of St. Francis Xavier, sent from Rome to the clergy at St. Aloysius' Church, will be exposed to veneration during the novena. A special shrine for the relic which has been encased in gold and jewels, will be erected in the church today.
