## WOOD GETS EIGHT OHIO DELEGATES

Unofficial Complete Returns Show Soldier Candidate Beaten By 17,000.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 29.—Complete unofficial returns from eighty-three out of eighty-eight counties and partial returns from the other five show that Senator Warren G. Harding carried Tuesday's Presidential preference elections in Ohio by a plurality of about 17,000 over Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood. The vote was: Harding, 133,984; Wood, 117,320.

## Average Living Costs Jump 94.8 Per Cent in 6 Years, Survey Shows

High Cost of Edibles Not Likely to Decrease for Some Time, Say Experts.

The high cost of living, hiding behind the wall of supply and demand, may withstand attacks for some time, according to official statistics.

## Food and Clothing Show Largest Increases in Last Four Months

BOSTON, April 29.—The average cost of living for American wage-earners rose 12.6 per cent between November, 1919, and March, 1920, according to a preliminary announcement made today by the National Industrial Conference Board.

## Use Old Weights

In estimating changes in the family budget as a whole each of the major constituent items must be weighted according to the expenditure for each by average wage-earning families.

## Prices Trebled

Prices this year are two to three times as high as last year, while shipments from the principal shipping sections, up to March, are about five-sixths what they were during the corresponding period a year ago.

## TABASCO WARS ON CARRANZA

Governor of State Declares in Favor of Revolution and Backs Rebels.

## U. S. WARSHIP HAS ARRIVED

Federal Troops and Commanders Do Not Relish Possibility of Meeting Villa.

SAN ANTONIO, April 28.—Six armored tanks, carrying machine guns, were ordered sent today from El Paso to Columbus, N. M., and Nogales, Ariz., by Maj. Gen. Joseph S. Dickman, commander of the Southern Department.

Each of these towns, which are on the border between the United States and Sonora, will get three tanks.

Reports from revolutionary sources indicate there is a likelihood of fighting between revolutionists and federal near both Nogales and Columbus.

Don Carlos Green, governor of the Mexican State of Tabasco, has declared in favor of the Sonora revolution, according to information reaching the Sonora agency here today.

## U. S. Warship Arrives

The Navy Department today received a report that the U. S. S. McCauley arrived at Topolobampo and the U. S. S. Salem arrived at Mazatlan on April 27. No report was made on conditions by the commanders of the vessels.

General Salvador Alvarado, representative of the Sonora faction, has left Washington for Galveston, Tex., and New Orleans, La., where he will confer with Mexican Congressmen from across the border.

General Rafael Buena has been appointed to command Carranza troops in Chihuahua, vice General Candide Aguilar, who has been directed to head an expedition against Tuxpam, along the border.

Luis Cabrera, Carranza's minister of finance in Mexico City, has given orders to all collectors of customs along the border to deposit receipts in banks on the American side.

Oregon has received from a Carranza staff officer details of a plan by Carranza for Oregon's arrest and imprisonment of the forces of Carranza.

Looting Is Reported. The U. S. cruiser Sacramento has reached Tampico and is prepared to offer protection to Americans there in the event of the revolution endangering them.

Looting has been reported in Alvarado, south of Vera Cruz where federal troops and rebels are understood to be fighting and much banditry is reported in the vicinity of Vera Cruz.

Bandits are also reported active near Guadalupe having attacked the power plant there.

Six hundred federal troops have arrived at Vera Cruz.

## ANTI-CARRANZA REVOLT CONTINUES TO SPREAD

By OSCAR X. GOLL. International News Service. HERMOSILLO, Mex., April 29.—The revolution against President Carranza continues to grow, according to reports received at general military headquarters of the secessionist State of Sonora.

During the past forty-eight hours, today's advice state, nine federalist garrisons have revolted and joined the "liberal constitutionalist" forces, the name chosen for the armies of secession.

Among the forces thus throwing their fortunes with Sonora's cause, it is reported, are 4,000 men under General Morales, and 2,000 soldiers in the States of Tapulipa, Michoacan, Chihuahua, Durango, Nayarit, and Guerrero.

Sonora troops, comprising the advancing army of General Flores, are reported as being within forty-eight hours of the important port of Mazatlan. (Continued on Page 3, Column 5.)
