DAINTY MENUS FOR ANTI-FAT CRUSADE

Illinois Women Contesting to Reduce Weight Have Appealing Food.

CHICAGO, May 3.—Fat persons are watching with great interest the sixty-day experiment in reducing weight which is being conducted here under the supervision of Dr. John Hill Robertson, city health commissioner.

The daily menus of the reducing class are prepared by Miss Ruth Wilbar of the health commissioner's training school for nurses, who believes this supervision of diet to be essential to success. Those ambitious to become slim are permitted to have lean meat but once a day and potatoes are forbidden. If one is hungry between meals Miss Wilbar suggests that a glass of water will satisfy that "empty feeling."

Here is a typical menu prepared by Miss Wilbar for one day:
 Breakfast—One medium apple, one egg, one slice of toast, one cup of coffee with one and a half table-

spoons of skimmed milk instead of cream.
 10:30 a. m.—One-half cup of bouillon with one cracker.
 Luncheon—Medium serving of lean cold roast beef, two thin slices of rye bread, lettuce and cottage cheese salad, two and one-half tablespoons of French dressing, tea with lemon, one cracker.
 Dinner—Large serving of boiled cod with lemon, large serving of plain cauliflower, one scant teaspoon of butter, lettuce salad or celery, one-half an orange, black coffee.
 10:30 p. m.—One-half cup hot skim milk.

Each of the women is expected to work an hour a day in her garden, if she has a garden; otherwise to take long walks and setting up exercises. Daily the women report by telephone and receive instructions, including a diet for the following day. On Thursday of each week they report at the City Hall and are weighed, and the week's loss or gain is recorded on their charts.

MAN YFARMS IDLE.
 CENTERVILLE, Mich., May 3.—Between 5,000 and 6,000 acres of tillable land will lie idle in St. Joseph county this year because there is no one to work it. In 32 out of 115 school districts in the county investigators found 106 vacant farm houses. Farm labor is not to be had, though farmers are offering \$70 to \$80 a month with board, room and washing.

BISHOP McDOWELL FOR WORLD LEAGUE

D. C. Divine Tells Conference in Iowa Peace, Not War, Must Rule.

DES MOINES, Iowa, May 3.—A strong and uncompromising demand for the League of Nations, with America as a leading member, was made yesterday afternoon by the thirty-four bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church at the Coliseum here. Also war was declared against world radicalism and inhuman standpatism alike, against Bolshevism and against reaction. The middle course of true democracy was pointed out as the only road the church could consistently take.

Bishop William F. McDowell, of Washington, president of the Baltimore Conference, delivered the address and was interrupted by frequent applause from the crowd which filled the big auditorium. He also touched on the great need of more ministers and missionaries, and for an adequate and sensible method of child training in the church. He declared the bishops' unalterable support of absolute prohibition and told of the need for some kind of substitute for the saloon. But the league declaration was a drat.

"Surely we must commit our church," the bishop said, "to the principle that international troubles shall be adjusted by counsel and arbitration, not by guns and slaughter of man; that the nations of the world shall be bound together by a working covenant of peace; that, however it shall be brought about, such compromise shall be made between the President of the United States on one hand and the Senate of the United States on the other as shall secure a real and effective league of nations, in which the United States shall have a proper and honorable place among the nations of the world in preserving the peace and bearing the burdens of the world."

"We are determined that narrow nationalism shall not set itself against world unity and a true internationalism; that we shall unite with the churches of all countries that are even now a drat.

"The church must have courage, faith, the spirit of adventure and supreme leadership in the realms of life; readiness to go anywhere with the Holy Spirit, wisdom to go nowhere without the Holy Spirit. The church of Christ must be sensitive and responsive to God's next great movements and must keep step with a living God.

Lady Astor Infers That Some Day Women May Take Vote From Men

LONDON, May 3.—Lady Astor has created another stir in the House of Commons by suggesting in a committee that women might eventually take the vote away from men. She didn't say it just that way, but she made a good, strong hint.

"Why are men voters so frightened of women who want to vote?" declared Lady Astor. "Surely men have made such a mess of things that the women are justified in taking the vote away from them. Why are men so frightened? Whether they get the vote or not women are going to get reforms. You need not fear the women, because we are going to give you what is best for you."

BANDITS HOLD UP 30 IN ROADHOUSE; GET \$3,100

CLIFTON, N. J., May 3.—Six masked gunmen held up thirty men in a roadhouse on Highland avenue early yesterday and took from them about \$2,000 in money and jewelry.

They also rifled the proprietor's safe of \$1,100 in cash and Liberty bonds. The bandits drove to the roadhouse in a touring car. They escaped before the police could be informed.

RECOUNT IN JERSEY WAITS ON SENATOR

Johnson Managers Put Final Decision on Recanvass of Ballots Up to Candidate.

NEW YORK, May 3.—An appeal has been made direct to Senator Hiram W. Johnson to decide if his campaign committee shall try to raise \$50,000 so that a certified check for that amount can be put up for a recount of the New Jersey Presidential primary votes.

Al C. Joy, the assistant manager at the Johnson headquarters, said yesterday that it would be possible for Senator Johnson to obtain a bond for \$50,000, but Justice Gummere has decreed that cash must be put up—not a bond. The court also decided that if a recount is made it must be of the entire State and not merely the five counties in which the Johnson managers believe they have found indications of fraud.

"The demand for \$50,000 in cash and the State-wide order are unprecedented," said Harry Kallech, counsel for the Johnson campaign committee.

"I have no criticism to offer as to Justice Gummere's order. But \$50,000 does seem an excessive sum, especially as we are asked to produce it immediately in cash. I sought to

BILLIONS EXPENDED SINCE WAR ENDED

Treasury Officials Assert \$5,000,000,000 Was Spent on Rails and Ships Alone.

Most of the \$5,000,000,000 spent upon the railroads and on ships by the Government, was expended after the armistice.

Treasury officials revealed this fact today, as figures were made public, emphasizing need for economy in Governmental expenditures.

The Shipping Board alone showed actual cash expenditures since armistice day amounting to \$1,600,000,000.

It was announced that despite the fact that the board was engaged in commercial shipping at a time when it was most profitable, the Shipping Board has not yet made any net return to the Treasury. The Shipping Board's expenditures still exceed its receipts by a wide margin. It was officially declared.

Rail control was also held to be a costly experiment. By continuing control of railroads a year and a quarter after the war stopped, transportation was furnished at less than cost, \$1,000,000,000 was tacked on to the taxpayer to pay the roads.
