### EASTERDAY DROVE WIFE OFF STAGE

Gloria Foy Fleed After Gun Threat—Lost Chance to Have Her Own Show.

the show and immediately following his mysterious exit from the city.

Another letter of the same date, also about his wife's contract, said: "Look here, don't you think you are fooling with a fool when I state to you that I do not wish my wife to fulfill any contract she may have made with you. I mean it, and if you wish to know anything of my reputation when anybody crosses me step to Wall Street and you will find out that no man will defy me."

"After this I hereby warn you not to dare allow my wife, Mrs. Wilen W. Easterday, using the name of Miss Gloria Foy to rehearse in your rehearsal hall or attempt to go into any show of yours or any other show."

"I am in the position both financially and politically to do you great injury if you disobey my order of allowing her to rehearse after the receipt of this letter on Monday, and I will be in New York to deal with you personally."

**Gun Threat To Wife.**  
In a postscript to his first letter about the contract Easterday wrote: "Will be back to N. Y. soon and will back a show for you."

**"W. W. E."**  
Members of the company said that Easterday did not appear in New York the day he had threatened to deal personally with the manager. The police had been notified then. But a few days later, Gloria, weeping, told them that Easterday had been there and had shown her "the very revolver he says he will kill me with if I don't leave and go with him."

They added that this scene was followed closely with service of summons in a suit against her, which proved to be the final straw that broke Gloria's defiance. This was three weeks ago. Gloria disappeared.

When Miss Foy became one of the company she gave her address as 284 Riverside Drive, the address reported to be that of Easterday's parents. She gave also the address of 224 West Fifty-second street, which she said was that of her mother. She said she was born in Covington, Ky., and attended the Holy Angels Academy, Fort Lee, N. J.

At the Riverside Drive address it was learned Mrs. Easterday had left her apartment and left without

giving an address. Easterday had left several weeks ago. The superintendent said Easterday's parents had never lived there. The apartment of Miss Foy's mother, at 224 West Fifty-second street, was closed.

### RUNNER TELLS OF BOND THEFTS PLOT

"Big Ed" Promised Him \$100,000 and Life of Ease to Steal, Says Broker's Boy.

NEW YORK, May 7.—"Now listen, kid. Here's a chance to clean up \$100,000 easy. You get us the stuff, and Jim and I'll slip you into Canada. We've got brokers up there who'll dispose of the stuff. If we get into trouble, there are big men who'll get us out in twenty-four hours."

"Come in with us, and you and your family will be on an easy street for life. I'll have a man in New York slip your mother \$5,000. Then when the thing blows over we'll slip your whole family to California where you can buy a home for them and live easy the rest of your life."

The speaker was "Big Ed" Furey. The time was February 6 last. The place was Room 1001 in the Hotel Claridge, this city. The "kid" was Murray Abramowitz, also known as "Murray Fox," trusted messenger for the brokerage house of Parrish & Co.

**"Turned Up" Plotter.**  
"Jim" was James Keay, former Burns detective, of Montreal, who has confessed his share in the \$5,000,000 bond plot.

Abramowitz, a dark eyed snappy youth of twenty, who resides with his parents, told last night how he had "turned up" Joseph Gluck and "Big Ed" Furey, two alleged agents of Nicky Arnstein.

The same day, February 6 last, Abramowitz had met Joe Gluck through a friend in the Parrish office. Joe asked him to go to the Claridge that night and meet a "couple of guys who'll put you on to something good."

Abramowitz said: "Joe took me to room 1001 in the Claridge and introduced me to a big man and a nervous, short man he called 'Jim.' The big man was Furey. The other, I learned later, was Keay."

**Asked Him to Steal Bonds.**  
"Furey unfolded the scheme to me. All I had to do was pinch a big wad of bonds or securities and meet Gluck and Furey in front of the Woolworth building. A 'Mr. Murray' came in the room. Furey said he

was in with a lot of big politicians and would get me out of trouble if anything happened. Murray was tall, bald-headed and wore a mustache. "Jim Keay was smoking and shaking with nervousness. He didn't seem keen on the job, but Furey assured him things would go through as he planned. I told Furey I would let him know next day whether I would deliver a lot of securities."

"Next day I went down to headquarters and told Detectives Mayer and Brown about the scheme. They instructed me to keep in with Furey, Gluck and Keay. That night I went to the Claridge again. Jim met me in the lobby. He said some other people were in room 1001."

**Needed Bonds At Once.**  
"We walked on the street and Keay said: 'We've got to get the stuff right away. Our brokers in Montreal have wired they must have the securities within twenty-four hours. We went back to the hotel and met Furey.'

"We arranged to meet in front of the Woolworth building, on the following Monday morning, when I was to turn the stuff over. When I went there Detectives arrested Furey and Gluck. This started the whole Arnstein investigation."

Abramowitz said the chief causes of bond robberies are underpaid runners, and slipshod methods of brokerage houses, adding: "When I worked for Parrish & Co. I held down three jobs, two under my assumed name of 'Murray Fox. I made \$45 or \$50 a week. Boys are forced to run two or three jobs to make a living."

**Finds Robbery Easy.**  
"Then, too, when a boy is holding down two or three jobs, he naturally turns over a lot of his deliveries to some friend he trusts who is going to the same place. This plays right into the hands of crooks like Joe Gluck and Furey."

"I have worked at a lot of places. At very few of them is any attention paid to references, names or addresses. It is the easiest thing in the world for a boy to phony a reference or give a false name and address. The brokerage houses, but it all up to the surety companies. Robberies will continue until these practices are stopped."

### PREACHER IS MAYOR.

EMPORIA, Kan., May 7.—Emporia has a preacher for a mayor. He is the Rev. J. C. Brogan, pastor of the Grace Methodist Church. The Rev. Brogan was elected mayor over H. B. Morse, incumbent, by a majority of 287 votes. He was endorsed by all of Emporia's labor unions.

### 3-EYED 2-SNOUDED PIG.
