TOLEDO, June 18.—An entire family, father, mother, son and nephew, were sentenced to Federal prisons by Judge John M. Killits, for running a "blind pig."
Louis Herman, the father, and proprietor of a notorious cabaret, was given two years and fined \$5,000. His wife drew eighteen months in a different prison, and the son, Marvin, and Henry Rosenbaum, a nephew, six months in another.

DANCER TELLS OF HIGH CARD STAKES

Beautiful Young Professional Says Elwell Frequently Played for \$30,000.

NEW YORK, June 18.—Fresh revelations concerning the activities of various sorts indulged in by Joseph B. Elwell, who was mysteriously murdered in his West Seventieth street home last Friday, continue to be made from day to day. The latest of these disclosures was forthcoming yesterday from Grace Langdon, a beautiful young professional dancer, from whom Elwell took lessons for a time shortly before he was killed.
"Mr. Elwell was a great dancer," said Miss Langdon. "He loved dancing, but he was never satisfied with his skill in the art, just the same as he never seemed to be satisfied with his skill in other things. He always wanted to improve and he was drawn to take lessons from me on this account."
"He always used to say that he could dance well enough with stout women—he had a sense of humor—but, being slim himself, he never danced quite well enough to suit himself with slender women. I am, of course, one of the slender women, and he thought it a good opportunity to learn dancing with slim women from me."
"In this way I got to know Mr. Elwell rather well. I went with him to dances at the Studio Club, where a number of well-known men and women also attended. Of course, there was card playing at this club, as well as dancing, and sometimes we women watched the men play. Yes, the stakes mounted occasionally, and one evening there was as much as \$30,000 that changed hands. Sometimes the women played too, but this was generally bridge whist and the stakes were not high. Mr. Elwell was one of the most generous men I ever knew anything about."

FIND BAMBOO IS GOOD WOOD PULP SUBSTITUTE

English Scientists Discover Its Value After Many Experiments.
LONDON, June 18.—Experiments are being conducted at the British Imperial Institute for the purpose of obtaining a satisfactory substitute for wood pulp. Bamboo is said to have given the most satisfactory results and to give better promises than any other of the substitutes tested.
It has been suggested that one way out of the difficulty would be for consumers in each country to form organizations on the lines of the British Cotton Growing Association for the purpose of encouraging and developing the production of pulp in various parts of the world.
At the present time England is practically dependent on Norway for supplies of the needed pulp. In a single week recently, according to figures obtained by the American Chamber of Commerce in London, 7,886 tons of mechanical wet pulp were imported from Norway, while only 490 tons were obtained from Canada.


ITALY'S WAR BILL 12 BILLION
