W. B. & A. ABSORBS ANNAPOLIS SYSTEM

Short Line Will Abandon Use of Baltimore and Ohio Tracks After September 1.

BALTIMORE, July 9.—By September 1, if not earlier, the Annapolis Short Line will abandon the use of the Baltimore and Ohio tracks, over which it enters Baltimore city, and Camden Station, which it has used as its Baltimore terminal for about thirty years. The use of these tracks and the terminal and a proportion of their maintenance costs the Short Line approximately \$50,000 a year.

This arrangement will be satisfactory to the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, which has use for rooms in Camden Station used by the Short Line, and for trackage that the Short Line uses. For a long time the Baltimore and Ohio has been anxious to get rid of its tenant, but as the Short Line has no other means of getting into Baltimore or of handling its traffic, it has been allowed to remain.


The Short Line will come into Baltimore over the Washington, Baltimore and Annapolis, and will use the Liberty street terminal of that road until a new terminal is erected in the block bounded by Eutaw, Lombard, Pratt and Howard streets, for which the Washington, Baltimore and Annapolis has obtained all the property it needs. Plans for financing the construction of the terminal, which will cost approximately \$400,000, are being made.

The use by the Short Line of the Washington, Baltimore and Annapolis tracks and terminals in Baltimore will be under a traffic agreement which will continue until the absorption of the Short Line by the Washington, Baltimore and Annapolis, which is expected to follow in a short time. Plans for this absorption are being worked out.

The traffic arrangement between the two roads is expected to result in a material improvement in the service on the Short Line, and this arrangement has been to some extent hastened.

Radio Compass Guides U. S. Navy Seaplane to Warship 95 Miles Out

Guided entirely by radio compass signals, naval seaplane F-5-L left Norfolk Wednesday and flew ninety-five miles on a "bee line" to pick up the battleship Ohio at sea, with no knowledge at the time of taking the air of the vessel's location.

The seaplane then navigated its return to Norfolk entirely by radio compass.

Navy Department officials said it was the first time radio compass apparatus had been used to direct aircraft to a ship.

CONNECT AT SHIPLEY.

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SHE REMOVES WAIST AND EXHIBITS SCARS IN COURT

HAGERSTOWN, Md., July 9.—Removing her top waist in police court, Mrs. Charles C. Baughman exhibited the bruises which, she testified, were inflicted by her husband, who was arraigned for wife-beating. Under escort of a policeman, Mrs. Baughman, after the beating, went to police station and swore out the warrant. Dr. W. M. Nihiser attended the woman. Justice John H. Bitner fined Baughman \$10 and costs. Mrs. Baughman said her husband became jealous because she took a seat in a street car beside a strange man.

Baughman said the fracas started because his wife refused to carry the baby on the return from Pen-Mar Park the day previous. The couple have been married fifteen years. Baughman is about thirty-eight years old. According to the testimony, this was not the first beating he gave his wife.

CARRANZA GIRL'S CHARGES IGNORED

United States Will Not Delay Recognition of Mexico Because of Protest.

Recognition of the new government in Mexico will not be delayed by the disclosures made to the State Department by Miss Julia Carranza, concerning the alleged responsibility of General Obregon for the death of General Carranza. This was the view expressed today at the State Department, after a careful study of the merits of the protest filed on behalf of the daughter of the late Mexican chief.

Acting Secretary of State Davis today read Miss Carranza's protest aimed at the present regime in Mexico, but refrained from comment as to its importance in the pending negotiations. Miss Carranza's charge that General Obregon is responsible for General Carranza's death is somewhat discounted, according to officials here, by other reports gathered by trained investigators of the State Department on the ground in Mexico.

Since General Carranza's death, it was said, the State Department has had adequate means of obtaining full information into the circumstances, and the department became fully conversant with the facts prior to the opening of negotiations recently with Iglesias Calderon, Mexican commissioner, here on special mission.

Sporadic outbreaks among various rebellious elements against the new Mexican regime, reported today in advices from American consular officers in Mexico, were not accepted by the State Department as indicating that any general revolt against the new Mexican government was imminent.

Daily reports of clashes in widely separated centers do not indicate trouble upon any large scale. Most of the fighting has been between small bands of disgruntled Mexicans, numbering, in most instances, less than 100, poorly armed. Consuls reported that in all of the minor revolts since De la Huerta assumed control, the Federal troops have routed the small bands after brief attacks.

FELICITATE UNITED STATES.

Messages of felicitation to the United States on the anniversary of July 4, have been received from Bolivia, Brazil, Cuba, Nicaragua, Salvador, Uruguay, Venezuela, Peru, Panama and Argentina, the State Department announced today.

UNDERTAKER TAKES TRIP WITH AVIATOR

Fliers Pay Tribute to Lieutenant Logan, Who Fell at Dundalk Field.

BALTIMORE, July 9.—Tribute was paid yesterday to the memory of Lieut. Patrick Henry Logan, who lost his life in an airplane accident last Monday at Dundalk Flying Field, when six aviators flew over the field and scattered flowers on the spot where he fell. Among those who enjoyed an air ride after the tribute was Stephen J. Frankowski, a local undertaker.

Aside from this floral tribute, the feature of the day was the pumber of persons taken aloft by visiting aviators. Six persons, several of whom had never been in an airplane before, took advantage of the opportunity to make a trip over the field. Of the six three were women, and apparently they enjoyed the experience greatly.

WOMAN MAY BUY PLANE.

Two of the women, Miss Laura Perkins and Miss Marie Perkins, visited the field with their aunt, Miss Charlotte Thompson, of Camden, S. C. The sisters took flights, and Miss Thompson declared she intended buying a plane similar to the one used by Capt. "Dinty" Moore.

Captain Moore showed his disregard for "bad omens" when he took up the undertaker's Friends of Captain Moore remarked that if an accident should happen he was "prepared for the worst." Others who flew yesterday were Mrs. R. F. Smith, L. S. Warfield and E. F. Wilson.

Col. H. M. Hickam arrived yesterday from Bolling Field, Washington, and went aloft. He will make several exhibition flights this afternoon. As in the past few days the "stunt" flying of Sergt. Harry S. Myers kept the spectators keyed up. Myers flew upside down for more than a minute, circling over the airfield.

SQUADRON FLIES OVER CITY.

Lieuts. Lyman Patterson, Wendell K. Phillips, W. D. Tipton, Capt. Temple Joyce and Sergeant Myers were in the squadron which flew over the city yesterday morning. During the flight tricks were exhibited for the benefit of thousands of persons who crowded Baltimore street and the downtown section. Literature was dropped telling of the work.

GOOD RECORD FREES HER WITH COURT'S WARNING

Woman Had Avoided Trouble for One Year, So Judge Practices Leniency.

FREDERICK, Md., July 9.—Because she had kept out of court one year and had oined the church, Justice J. Graham Johnson yesterday discharged Mrs. Lou Bell, charged with severely beating her nine-year-old son and disorderly conduct. She holds a record for appearing in court and is regarded as the most quarrelsome woman in this city. Several neighbors commented on the chastisement she gave her son and her replies constituted the disorderly charge. She testified that her son stayed away from home for three days and when he returned she whipped him. Later she whipped him for breaking branches from a neighbor's cherry tree. The lad's back, examined in court, bore marks of the beating. During the trial she endeavored to have her husband testify, but he remained silent. He is an industrious man and has never been in court except when he appears with his wife when she is arrested and pays her fine. After she was dismissed her husband handed her several notes, with which she paid her attorney and the pair left for home. Justice


