HAPPENINGS IN SOCIETY

Japanese Visitors to Be Feted—Secretary Colby Returns From Brief Visit in New York

THE JAPANESE AMBASSADOR AND MME. SHIDEHARA will entertain at dinner at the embassy tomorrow in compliment to Capt. Hiego Tera Oka, of the Japanese cruiser Kasuga, and the officers of the ship who will come to Washington tomorrow to pay their respects to the United States Government. They will stay at the New Willard.

The Kasuga, which has been anchored in the Hudson river for a week went yesterday to Annapolis for a visit to the Naval Academy. From Annapolis the cruiser will go to Norfolk, then to New Orleans, to Havana and to San Francisco by way of the Panama canal. The Kasuga spent some time in Malae, taking part in the centennial celebration there.

On Friday Captain Oka will entertain at luncheon aboard the Kasuga, his guests including the Japanese Ambassador, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Acting Secretary of the Navy; Rear Admiral Robert E. Coontz, chief of operations, U. S. N.; Rear Admiral Albert P. Niblack, and a number of other officers.


