

FETE MAN FREED BY MRS. WILSON'S AID

Jerome Isaacs Returns to His Home in Baltimore After Acquittal.

BALTIMORE, Sept. 13.—Acquitted at Danville, Va., Friday of a charge of impersonating a secret service officer and also of a charge of larceny of \$500, Jerome Isaacs, 2225 McCulloh street, whose case won the personal interest of President and Mrs. Wilson, arrived in Baltimore yesterday, following a party given him at Danville by persons who became interested in his case.

Isaacs was arrested at a hotel in Danville last March on a charge preferred by Miss Margaret Russell, who said he entered her room and robbed her of \$500. Isaacs gave \$1,000 bail, but was in University Hospital when the trial came up. Miss Russell then preferred a federal charge of impersonating a secret service officer. The case was postponed until September and Isaacs made an appeal to Mrs. Wilson. She obtained records of the case and replied that President Wilson had placed the case in the hands of Attorney General Palmer.

At the trial Friday District Attorney Joseph H. Chitwood, of Roanoke, Va., represented Attorney General Palmer in behalf of Isaacs. Danville residents were so interested in Isaacs that they appointed a committee headed by Samuel Mandie, a business man, to aid the young man. Following the acquittal a party was tendered by Mandie to Isaacs.

INFANTILE PARALYSIS EPIDEMIC IN BOSTON

BOSTON, Sept. 13.—The number of infantile paralysis cases in Massachusetts has now reached the proportions of an outbreak, largely confined so far to the metropolitan district. Dr. Lyman A. Jones, acting first deputy State health commissioner, has issued the following statement:

"It can properly be termed an outbreak. Every possible step is being taken to cope with the situation. All patients should be isolated for at least four weeks. They should, of course, be kept out of schools, be given rest and receive the best possible treatment. Special attention should be paid to the necessity of having expert advice as to massage and exercise."

SUFFRAGE MAKES INDIANA DOUBTFUL

State Normally Is Republican, But "Normalcies" Cannot Be Relied Upon.

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 13.—No where in the country, perhaps, has the enfranchisement of the women conjured up more uncertainty as to political prospects than in Indiana. Where the men only to be considered here in the forthcoming election, the probabilities are that the Republicans would carry this pivotal State. They may do so with the women voting, and the Republicans say they will. But they admit that the women have not them guessing.

By reason of the suffrage amendment the voting population here, it is estimated, will be approximately doubled. Normally Indiana is Republican, so that if the wives and sisters and the daughters of the voting age, divided in the proportion of the men, the vote might be expected to divide so: Republicans, 750,000; Democrats, 715,000. But no one is sure that they will so divide.

The League of Nations controversy is an important consideration with the women, but it is not the most important. Several days ago there was a meeting in Indianapolis of the war mothers. Some missives of the grand old party were present with the glad hand and a feeling of hope. They desired an endorsement of the Harding-Coolidge ticket by the War Mothers. But for some reason the mothers were cool toward the proposition. Eventually the reason came out.

"If," said one of the women speakers, "it is true that Senator Harding, in his speech of acceptance, declared for a separate peace with Germany, I think the War Mothers can well afford to wait awhile before pledging ourselves. I don't think we sent our boys across the ocean with any idea that we would desert our allies and make a separate peace."

On the other hand there is the wet and dry issue which the Republicans are seeking to spread quietly among the women as an offset to the bad effect among them of Harding's attitude on the League and separate peace.

CAPTURE MASTER BANDIT AND 4 PALS

Jesse James of Oil Fields Boasts He Got \$65,000 Loot in Two Weeks.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Sept. 13.—A sensational crime career rivaling the lurid adventures of a Jesse James was revealed today by C. C. Mins, "master bandit" of the oil fields, captured with four confederates after a cabaret hold-up and running gun fight at Ranger, Mins, who is only twenty-two, boasted to police he had led his gang on hold-ups that netted them \$65,000 in two weeks.

Police declare the arrest of Mins and his confederates will end a wave of hold-ups and robberies which swept the oil fields like a pestilence. According to authorities, Mins said his gang had obtained \$7,000 in the robbery of the Graham National Bank two weeks ago and gained \$7,000 more in cash by the hold-up of a poker game at Ranger two nights ago. The rest of their loot came from highway assaults on individuals.

Mins is now under bonds on a charge of assault with intent to murder; is held in jail on charges of shooting with intent to kill, and robbery; is under a five-year sentence for manslaughter, and is wanted on a number of charges at Ranger.
