AMERICANS SUFFER IN HONDURAN RIOTS

Mine Paymaster Robbed of \$40,000 and Bank Looted in Capital.

American interests have begun to suffer as a result of the disorders rapidly increasing in Honduras in protest against alleged acts of oppression on the part of President Rafael Lopez Gutierrez. The paymaster of the Rosario Mining Company of New York was held up and robbed of \$40,000 while on his way from Tegucigalpa to the mine, it became known here today.

The robbers, it is reported, wore the uniforms of government troops. This robbery was followed by the looting of a bank in the capital, which is situated below a suite of government offices in which the president has a private apartment. The robbery, which took place in broad daylight, yielded more than \$50,000.

Open letters and manifestos signed by prominent public men are being openly circulated in Tegucigalpa. Argueta, declares the people have been betrayed by Gutierrez, who has violated his pledges to terminate oligarchy and that the "moment approaches when Honduras must vindicate their rights."

Dispatches received here state that of the 3,000 political refugees who had fled the country, about 1,000 have made their way back from Guatemala and Salvador and that the rebel forces in the department of Olancho have increased to more than 800.

ROBBED 12 TIMES, BRITON BIDS CHICAGO GOOD-NIGHT

CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—Robbed of an even dozen pocketbooks, purses and wallets in less than a month's stay in Chicago, Joseph Solomon Marks is headed home for Lonsome town today, with the remains of his roll padlocked in a tough pigskin purse, which in turn is secured to a re-enforced trousers waistband by a manganese chain.

Marks, who planned to sell jewelry to the Chicago trade, endured eleven robberies in the spirit of an adventurer in a far country. But with the twelfth robbery came the end of the limit.

It happened when he went into a jewelry store on the West Side. Two men with revolvers welcomed him, hustled him into a back room and trussed him up alongside the jeweller. After the reception committee had taken Mark's money and jewelry he saw the point and arranged to return to London.

FREIGHT TRAFFIC AT NORMAL LEVEL

Congestion Disappearing and Need of Car Control by Government Ended.

Railroads in the United States have practically attained the pre-war level of freight movement and there no longer exists an emergency necessitating governmental control of freight and freight car movement.

This was stated by a high official, who predicted that within a short time public acknowledgment of this fact would be made by rescinding the emergency order issued May 20 by the Interstate Commerce Commission in which all existing rules

and regulations covering the movement and routing of both empty and loaded freight and coal cars were suspended.

The prediction is based on reports by the car service commission, which show that the movement of loaded freight cars during the week ended September 4 was within 10,000 of the highest pre-war record.

That the normal volume of employment on the railways has been reached is indicated by the priority order issued by the commission last week in which the words "Aggravated by unfavorable labor conditions" were omitted in declaring the existence of an emergency.

During the week ended September 4, according to reports reaching the car service commission, the railroads moved 985,000 cars of loaded freight. The highest record ever attained even during the war was about 1,000,000 cars. It was said at the offices of the commission today that reports on the movement for the week ended September 11 which are coming in indicate that the 1,000,000 mark may have been passed.

RETURNS TO JAIL 'HOME' AS COLD WEATHER NEARS

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 20.—Manuel Costa, better known in the city as "Pogey," who has been an occupant of the city jail every winter for twenty years, is again "at home" in a cell reserved for his use, and he will remain there for three months.

When he appeared before Police Judge McAtee he asked to be sent to jail for six months, explaining to the court that by the expiration of his sentence the Alaskan fishing season would be open and he would be ready to go north. Judge McAtee compromised on three months.

COSTS \$5 TO BEAT WIFE.

SHARPSBURG, Md., Sept. 20.—Ver-non Wolf, a large man, arrested on the charge of beating his frail wife and putting her and her child out of the house by nailing boards across the doors, was fined \$5 and costs by Justice Blackford for assault.
