

BAY RIDGE MAY GET \$3,000,000 HOTEL

Promoter Contemplates 500-Room Building to Replace the Burned Chamberlin.

BALTIMORE, Sept. 28.—That Bay Ridge, on the Chesapeake, may be selected as the site for a hotel to cost from \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000 was announced yesterday by George F. Adams, manager of the famous Hotel Chamberlin, at Old Point Comfort, Va., destroyed by fire last year.

Mr. Adams, at Hotel Bennett last night, said plans for the proposed hotel called for a structure that would contain probably 500 rooms, with beautiful surroundings, golf links, salt-water bathing, and all that goes to make an up-to-date resort of the highest class, and that it would be conducted along the lines of the Chamberlin. He said he had made a survey of the Bay Ridge property and that the location seemed ideal, but that no decision would be made until after a thorough investigation.

A tentative price has been obtained from officials of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, owners of the property. Mr. Adams said he expected to make another visit to the property today and then would take the matter up with the capitalists by whom he has been commissioned to select a suitable site. Two seacoast sites, it was said, also are under consideration.

That the selection of Bay Ridge would be of great importance to Baltimore and the country in the vicinity was pointed out by Mr. Adams, who said resorts of this character always had resulted in improvement of the locality, as persons of wealth were at-

REPUBLICAN SECRETARY OUTLINES MARINE AIMS

Sale of the United States Shipping Board merchant vessels "for what they will bring," and the creation of a fund of \$25,000,000 a year for five years to assist in constructing additional ships, yesterday was declared to be the Republican shipping policy in a statement issued by the Republican National Chairman White who declared that United States shipping had been "emancipated from foreign domination of its commerce" during the existence of the Shipping Board, created during the war.

EAST SHORE BUS LINE ASKS TO REDUCE FARE

Request Surprises Maryland Service Board Which Quickly Consents to Revision.

BALTIMORE, Sept. 28.—Fred F. Jump, of Centreville, who operates a bus line between Chastertown and Easton, through Centreville, so startled the Public Service Commission yesterday that it could hardly keep its collective mind upon the gas rate case which was up for a hearing.

Mr. Jump confessed that he was making too much money and went before the commission to ask that he be permitted to make a reduction in fares. He wanted to cut the fare from Chastertown to Easton, from \$4 to \$3, and from Centreville to Easton to \$2.50.

He was given permission at once and was not allowed to get out of the place until the matter had been fixed up. The commission also, and of its own motion, abrogated the customary forty days notice of a change in rates, so the new fares on Mr. Jump's bus line can go into effect at once.

MD. REQUIRES LICENSES FOR OYSTER TONGERS

EASTON, Md., Sept. 28.—The conservation commission has instructed the county commissioners to get in touch with oystermen and see that they take out the proper license. Ordinarily there are issued about 600 licenses to oyster tongers, but this year only a little over 200 have been issued.

Oyster police boat captains have been instructed to stop tonging all those who have failed to take out a license this year. The fee is \$3.75.

FOODSTUFFS RISE IN EXPORTS TRADE

August Showed Comparative Increase of 40 Million Dollars From U. S. Larder.

Export of breadstuffs during August leaped skyward, \$118,000,000 worth being sent out of the country as compared with \$78,110,000 worth in August, 1919, according to the monthly report of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, made public today. Nevertheless, there were but \$684,000,000 worth of breadstuffs exported during the first eight months of 1920, as compared with \$688,000,000 of last year, showing a slight falling off in the aggregate.

Wheat exports alone for August, 1920, amounted to \$80,138,100, as compared with \$31,307,917 worth in August, 1919.

Cotton exports showed a marked falling off, according to the report only 146,985 bales, valued at \$28,561,505 having been shipped out of the United States during August, 1920, as compared with 479,068 bales, valued at \$81,542,841 in August, 1919.

Cottonseed oil exports decreased from 9,220,628 pounds in August, 1919, to 2,963,330 pounds during the corresponding period this year.

Mineral oils for export increased to \$48,079,856 in August, 1920, from \$24,894,885 worth in August, 1919.

Meat and dairy products exported decreased, the amounts being \$24,257,578 for August, 1920, as against \$85,909,713 for August, 1919.


