

PLAN NATIONAL BUILDINGBOOM

Bankers, Contractors and Workers in Chicago Congress Launch Drive.

CHICAGO, Sept. 28.—Heroic steps being necessary to revive the building industry in the United States, with a shortage of 1,000,000 homes and billions of dollars in construction contracts held up for many reasons, leaders of the construction industry met here yesterday and formed the National Industrial Congress of Building Construction.

The sever organizations controlling building throughout the country held themselves responsible for the almost complete stoppage of construction and agreed to work together to end the condition.

The new building congress is an elaboration of the British Industrial Council for the Building Industry. But where only the British employers and labor got together and agreed to end the building crisis, all seven of the industries in the United States which are elements in construction agreed to come to the country's rescue.

This congress will make a nationwide survey of the country's building needs and some time before June 1, 1921, start operations to lead the way out of the wilderness.

A committee was appointed to form the "supreme court of American building." After several hours of hot discussion the committee got together and reported out a resolution calling for the creation of the new congress.

It was adopted amid wild enthusiasm. Labor, capital and all of the intermediaries agreed to work together. Even the investment bankers of America, not represented at the meeting, were given two members on the executive committee, which is to pass on all jurisdictional matters in the industry. It was declared that the bankers must understand the present problems of construction or there will be no building done.

There has been \$4,000,000,000 worth of building contracts let in the United States in the last eight months, it was declared by Gen. R. G. Marshall, of Washington. Much of this contract work is suspended because of high prices, labor troubles and lack

of financing. The salvation of the nation and the industry is to get completion of these contracts under way, he stated, and it was up to the new congress to do it.

It was pointed out by Chairman Kohn that building material prices are dropping, but must come a long way yet before bankers are going to listen to investors.

It was unanimously agreed by the leaders present at the birth of the building congress that the importance of the move could not be overestimated. They said the spectacle of all of the elements in one of the biggest industries in the country getting together and taking part of the blame for wrongs within and officially pledging themselves to right these wrongs as a public duty give great promise for the future.

GERMANY PLANS TO SOCIALIZE MINES

Coal Fields to Go Under State Control—Radicals Favor Ownership Scheme.

BERLIN, Sept. 28.—Although its plans are still in the making, the German Government undoubtedly intends to socialize the mining industry. But the socializing of mines will not be as radical as it sounds. Instead of actual ownership by the State, which extremists are seeking, there will be a modified Government control, based probably on Minister Rathenau's scheme.

In this event, the Federal Government would dictate such features of the industry as output, prices, the amount of interest permitted mine owners and premiums to the owners and workers for increased production.

Minister Giesbert, formerly a miner, said that "America need not fear the actual socialization of our mines in the sense that the State would confiscate the property."

"The socialization which we propose," he said, "is the natural result of the Spa conference—which left us with coal practically our only asset whereas we may meet our debts. Hence the need to reduce the cost of production. We cannot afford to invest millions in improvements and machinery and then have the mine owners take the profits."

"Accordingly, the Cabinet has instructed the Minister of Economics to work out a plan for modified socialization."

Herr Giesbert himself favors Government control of the mine output and management, and the prevention of improper sales of coal outside Germany.

A majority of German Socialists are not in favor of the State scheme. They believe that if Rathenau's plans are adopted, this will be sufficiently socialistic for the present.

Wissell, former Minister of Economics and one of the authors of Rathenau's measure, explains that the scheme will permit private owners to retain their property rights, but forces them to act "with wisdom and justice." It also, he says, eliminates much bureaucratic red tape. A second plan proposed, which has gained little headway, would exclude the owners from mine management.

The completed legislation probably will be ready for action in the Reichstag within a short time. There is some prospect for the passage of a clause making labor compulsory.

D. C. HEBREWS OBSERVE FEAST OF TABERNACLE

Starting yesterday and lasting through today, Succoth, the Feast of the Tabernacle, is being celebrated by Washington Hebrews. The holiday corresponds in some respects to Thanksgiving, and originated in the celebration of the reaping of the harvest.

In all of the local synagogues services were held last night to which the congregation brought contributions of fruit, vegetables, and groceries. These gifts were collected and sent to the Jewish benevolent institutions in various parts of the city. Similar services will be conducted this evening.

REDS SET WALL ST. BOMB, SAYS BURNS

Adherents of Third International of Russian Soviet Blamed by Detective.

NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—Adherents of the Third International of the Russian Soviet are charged with direct responsibility for the Wall Street bomb explosion by William J. Burns the noted detective.

Mr. Burns said the 3,500 city and Federal detectives who were attempting to solve the mystery must have time to piece together the clues in their possession, but he predicted that responsibility for the crime would ultimately be laid at the door of the International. He prophesied it would be found that the Russian Reds had sent highly skilled chemists here to compound the explosive used.

"It is a matter of common knowledge by the police," said Mr. Burns, "that the Reds have experts who can compound even more powerful explosives than they could purchase in the markets."

Chief Flynn, of the Bureau of Investigation, Department of Justice, refused to comment on Mr. Burns' statement except to say the Government was investigating with energy.

E. E. Timon, the architect who sketched the scene of the explosion a few seconds after he was jarred from his seat in an office, is regarded as an important witness by officials of the Bureau of Investigation.

Frank B. Colton, an attorney, who told Assistant District Attorney Talley Saturday that he had seen "du Pont" on a wagon on the day of the explosion on Wall Street, between William and Pearl streets, testified yesterday before the grand jury. He said the wagon was labeled "explosives" underneath the name of the powder concern, the architect who sketched the scene of the explosion a few seconds after he was jarred from his seat in an office, is regarded as an important witness by officials of the Bureau of Investigation.

Anonymous letters threatening the postoffice, courthouse and public school buildings of Jersey City with destruction were received yesterday by Special Agent O'Neil, of the department of Justice and Police Chief Richard Battersby, of Jersey City.
