"Big Three" Alliance Backs U. S. Against Japan, Germans Say

BERLIN, Oct. 3.—I cannot, of course, reveal the sources of my information, but the character of these sources leaves no doubt in my mind as to the truth of my information, that President Wilson, Great Britain and France entered into a secret agreement in 1917 in regard to Mexico and Japan.

Count Von Reventlow made that statement to me today, when I asked him for the basis of his sensational article in the first issue of Der Reichart, of which he is editor.

He told me Great Britain was represented by Arthur J. Balfour and France by Andre Tardieu in the making of the alleged agreement, which he decided was consummated at the time Balfour was in the United States, immediately after the entry of the States into the world war.

Reventlow said that his information came from Washington, and intimated that it was through an indiscretion.

The count is on friendly terms with certain Japanese, and it is not improbable that his information comes from this source. He believes sincerely in the accuracy of his information.

In the third number of Der Reichart, two weeks hence," he said, "I shall tell more details of this secret agreement."

NEED BIG NAVY AGAINST JAPAN

Foreign Relations Head, Back From Far East, Urges Building Program.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 3.—"This trip has convinced me that the United States should build the biggest navy in the world," declared Congressman S. A. Porter, of Pennsylvania, as he stepped off the army transport Madawaska here, returning with members of the Congressional committee which investigated conditions in the Far East.

Congressman Porter declined to disclose his reasons for reaching the conclusion.

FOREIGN RELATIONS CHAIRMAN. Congressman Porter is chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations.

"When Congress reconvenes I intend to work for such a navy," he said.

Congressman John F. Small of North Carolina, chairman of the delegation, expressed the belief, as a result of his investigation in Japan, that the present attitude in Japan is largely bluffing and that the government of Japan will agree to any steps taken by this government in the Japanese immigration matter.

A Korean editor was jailed because he wrote an editorial welcoming the new United States Congressmen to Seoul. We objected to this and he was released. The Japanese did their best to keep us from getting at the truth."

POLAND BREAKS OFF PEACE PARLEY WITH REDS

PARIS, Oct. 3.—The Russo-Polish peace conference at Riga has collapsed, according to reports from Geneva to the newspaper L'Intransigent today.

According to the report, the Poles broke off negotiations, charging the Soviet envoys with bad faith. The peace parley had been in progress at Riga for about a fortnight, having been transferred to that city from Minsk.

MEXICAN ARMY CUT 30,000.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 3.—Thirty thousand Mexican soldiers will be retired on half pay immediately. It was announced by the government yesterday.

LENINE UKASE WINS AT MILAN

Italian Reds Adopt Third International Urging Victor Emmanuel's Downfall.

TURATI FIGHTS RUSS IDEA

Socialist Deputies Flock to Support, and Split in Party Rooms.

MILAN, Oct. 3.—By a vote of seven to five the Socialist party executives in session here passed a resolution declaring the party adherent to the Third Internationale.

This decision caused widespread surprise as it was generally believed that Italian Socialists would reject the twenty-one demands of Lenin, Bolshevik premier, among which was an order to conduct revolutionary propaganda in the army and make strenuous efforts to overthrow the monarchy.

MAY OUST "MODERATES." The decision was taken to imply that moderate members of the party, such as Turati, Modigliani, Treves, and Prampolini, representing the real brains of the party, would be expelled from its ranks.

As a matter of fact a split within the ranks of the Italian Socialist Party is already under way. It is very doubtful whether the extremists will be able to obtain a majority when the national congress convenes at Florence in December or January to ratify the resolution passed by the party executives.

TURATI RALLIES FORCES. According to reports current in the Chamber of Deputies since Lenin's ukase was received here, nearly one hundred Socialist deputies have rallied to the support of the moderate leader, Turati.

It was believed the split would result in formation of three parties—revolutionary, communists, and a reform element. The last mentioned will likely have the largest following.

The editor of Avanti, the Socialist newspaper, resigned that post despite entreaties that he remain until the national congress convened.

DEBS DECLARES HE WON'T ASK PARDON

Tells Socialists Palmer Would Like to Free Him But Doesn't Know How.

ATLANTA, Oct. 3.—Eugene V. Debs, Socialist candidate for President, will not ask the Government to pardon him, but will stand on the party contention that he is being denied a constitutional right and should never have been convicted, according to an announcement made by a conference between the candidate and members of the Committee on the National Executive Committee in the Federal penitentiary.

A report was made at the conference by George E. Bower, Jr., of Boston, chairman of a special committee, which conferred with Attorney General Palmer, September 14, relative to Mr. Debs' release.

"I am fully convinced that Mr. Palmer would like to get rid of us, but he doesn't know how," said Debs during the conference.

The conference between Debs and the committee will be resumed to-day and the final conference will take place tomorrow before the committee leaves for Chicago. Several nationally well-known socialists were present.

30 ALLEGED PROFITEERS INDICTED IN OKLAHOMA

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Oct. 3.—Following return by the Federal grand jury of indictments alleged to contain sufficient evidence of profiteering to warrant prosecuting, thirty Oklahoma city merchants and restaurant proprietors were placed under arrest here late yesterday.

The Federal grand jury charged excessive prices for food, clothing and fuel.

Warrants were also issued for the arrest of two Enid, Okla., merchants and one at Anadarko, Okla.

Those arrested gave bonds of \$1,000 each and will be arraigned Tuesday morning.

PAPER ADVANCES PRICE.

Saved Husband From Noose In Swope Case, Now She Asks Divorce

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 3.—Charging extreme cruelty and violence, Mrs. Frances Swope Hyde, wife of Dr. B. Clark Hyde, who was three times tried on a charge of murder in connection with the death of Mrs. Hyde's uncle, Thomas H. Swope, millionaire philanthropist, has filed suit for divorce.

In her petition, Mrs. Hyde asks for the custody of a son six years old and a daughter four. The petition asserts Dr. Hyde is not financially able to care for the children and is not a fit person to have charge of them.

Mrs. Hyde, the petition adds, is financially able to care for the children.

After asserting that the marriage was performed June 21, 1905, and that Mrs. Hyde and her husband lived together until August 1, 1920, the petition says:

"The defendant disregarded the duties of a husband, and has been guilty of repeated and constant acts of cruelty and violence toward the plaintiff, and has applied appropriate epithets to her and to her friends in the presence of the children. He has, by studied words and conduct, tried to estrange her children and her friends from her and has exhibited a sullen, morose and cruel disposition."

STOOD BY THEM IN TROUBLE. Interest in assertions made by Mrs. Hyde's suit is augmented by comparison with her attitude toward her husband shortly after his trial in 1910, when he was found guilty of numerous poisonings, including her mother.

"It is a wife's duty not to question her husband, but to believe what he says," she declared at that time, "I do not ask if he is a murderer—I have no right to ask that question. No matter what he is, he is my husband, and whatever I have—life or money—belongs to him."

The doctor had been tried on thirteen counts in eleven indictments. Two of them charged first-degree murder.

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Bernstorff, Predicting Harding Victory, Says U. S. Will Enter League

BERLIN, Oct. 3.—"According to human calculations, Senator Harding, the Republican candidate, will carry off the victory in the Presidential elections," prophesies Count Von Bernstorff, former German ambassador in Washington, one of the leading advocates of the League of Nations in Germany, in an article entitled "We and America," appearing in a local periodical.

Bernstorff warns the Germans against expecting anything from the United States.

"In political relations we have nothing to expect from the United States," he writes. There is simply no interest there for European politics. Interest in America for Europe extends only to economic and humanitarian ideas. America is thoroughly weary of European politics and that is wholly comprehensible in view of the disappointments that the war brought the United States. The Americans started out to found a better world than the old one, a completely demoralized Europe behind."

Bernstorff tells the Germans that no important political decision need be expected in America until the new President takes office. Then a resolution of Congress will end the condition of war with Germany and the details of peace be worked out.

"Once those negotiations are at an end," Bernstorff says, "the League of Nations will join the League of Nations with certain restrictions and reservations."

He thinks those reservations will be in the direction of keeping the League of Nations free from all responsibilities of what happens in Europe. He says political surprises in America are not uncommon, but he says the old doctrine of non-interference in European affairs is advocated.

The former German-American ambassador, who is now busy writing his second book, explains that he wrote his first volume "to help his country to victory." While the nonratification of the Versailles treaty in America is gratifying to Germany, Bernstorff says it is in the interest of truth and of political clarity that the German people should know that this was done out of no motive of friendship or sympathy for Germany. He believes that after the state of war is formally ended it will not be difficult to restore business relations between the two countries, but thinks it will be some time before mutual distrust is fully dissipated.

"In America it has never been forgiven us that we did not accept Wilson's peace mediation and that we went ahead and declared the 'U-boat war,' he continues. "On the other hand," he continues, "that America permitted the Carruthian peace after the acceptance of Wilson's fourteen points. With that both sides seem to have balanced, the more so as nothing in the past can be changed. It is high time, therefore, that both sides forget their resentment, especially as a reconstruction of the world seems possible only on the basis of reconciliation of all peoples and with mutual co-operation."

GOVERNOR ASKS PAY FOR PRISONERS IN SING SING

OSSENING, N. Y., Oct. 3.—Predicting that the time would come when no man would be sentenced in a court room, but if adjudged guilty would be turned over to an institution where a corps of trained experts would "determine the length of time he shall be kept in" Governor Alfred E. Smith today laid the cornerstone of the new Sing Sing prison.

He also urged that wages be paid prisoners for their labor. Governor Smith declared that out of 200 prisoners whose sentences he has commuted in twenty-one months only one has been returned to prison.

BOSTON SPORT TO BARE PLOT

John J. Sullivan Promises Exposure of Gigantic Gambling Coup.

SOX HOAX NATION-WIDE

N. Y. Police Still Seek Attell, Who, Cicotte Says, Was Go-Between.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—The "inside" story of the "framing" of the 1919 world's series is expected to be brought to light within the coming week. The persistent naming of a number of New York sporting men in connection with the greatest hoax ever perpetrated in the history of American sport has stirred the authorities both here and in Chicago to put forth the utmost effort in uncovering the whole affair and no stone will be left unturned to get at the identity of the "men higher up."

SWANN'S QUESTIONS ATTEND. District Attorney Swann, of New York County, today called upon Abe Attell, former featherweight champion, to come forward and reveal information he claims to have regarding the "fixing" of the series last fall.

"There is sufficient law aside from the grand jury statutes," said Swann today, "to bring about severe punishment for those who are responsible if they are convicted. Abe Attell has boasted that he knows a number of crooked gamblers who made a dishonest deal with certain members of the Chicago White Sox and I feel that it is time for him to tell all he knows."

"We want him to come and tell us who was responsible for the dishonorable bargain and I have several agents searching for him now. I want to know if any money was paid or won in New York County and if so the names and addresses of the persons who were paid, or who were in Chicago, this constitutes a felony in this county."

REPORT "ABE" REFUSES. It was reported today that Attell will refuse to comply with the District Attorney's request unless a formal charge is made against him. His attorney is quoted as saying that if he is indicted either here or in Chicago he will face the charges willingly.

That there was a "master mind" behind the "fixing" of the last world's series is "report" Sullivan will lay before the grand jury in Chicago, according to an acquaintance of Sullivan here today. Sullivan, it was stated, will tell the Chicago jurists "the whole inside story of the franchise."

Sullivan, it is stated, claims to know the man who directed the "framing" of the series between the Reds and White Sox, and because he claims to have been made the "goat" he threatens to tell the entire story.

The clearing up of reports that members of the Brooklyn club had been approached by gamblers in an attempt to "frame" the sport world is being handled with satisfaction by baseball fans here today, but District Attorney Lewis, the prosecutor of King's county, while convinced that the members of the Dodgers are guiltless, is prepared to run every available bit of information into the ground.

TROOPS HUNT EX-CHAMP. District Attorney Charles R. Weeks, of Nassau county, has issued subpoenas for Abe Attell and Joseph "Curley" Bennett for appearance before Justice Swann, who is conducting a John Doe inquiry into gambling conditions. Troopers of the State constabulary, armed with the subpoenas, are searching for Attell and Bennett. Mr. Weeks said he thought the investigation would throw light on the operations of the gambling houses of Nassau county, particularly a place at Long Beach.

Officials of the New York State income tax bureau are following closely the investigation of the baseball in Chicago. They are watching for any indication that money received by Chicago players was paid in New York State or that New York gamblers made any profit from the betting on the series.

Under the New York State law money made by gambling is taxable, and even non-residents who play in New York State are required to file returns. The penalty for evasion of the income tax law is \$1,000 fine or one year's imprisonment or both.

CHICAGO JURORS AWAIT SULLIVAN'S CONFESSION
