'COAL FAMINE' FALSE ALARM

Cushing Charges Fuel Prices Are Kept High by Undue Agitation of "Commissions."

Coal prices are being maintained at the present high levels by the action of local authorities, and State and national commissions, which indicate a shortage of the commodity and not because of the laws of supply and demand, George H. Cushing, director of the American Wholesale Coal Dealers Association, today declared.

CHARGES FALSE ALARM TACTICS.

Cushing said the efforts on the part of public officials to "make it appear that there is a coal shortage by the issuance of orders aimed to increase production is causing a false alarm that the figures do not bear out." Cushing declared.

Priority orders issued by the Interstate Commerce Commission have not increased the output of coal, Cushing declared. He pointed to his statement of several months ago that a production of 535,000,000 tons would be sufficient until the end of the year. He said figures up to October 2 show that 545,000,000 tons will be mined. "I hold there is no shortage," Cushing added.

"How will the extension of the coal priority orders farther west to include all of the Middle West affect the situation?" Cushing was asked.

"It further complicates it and will not increase production a ton," he replied. "Priority orders have meant nothing more than bad distribution."

"Lumber, shoes, grain and other markets have declined. Coal prices have not. This is caused by the false shortage the people have been made to believe exists," Cushing declared.

Contrary to the opinion expressed by Cushing the National Coal Association maintains that the priority orders which have been issued are a help in the increased production of coal. The association, through John Callahan, its traffic manager, declares, however, that if conditions can be maintained until December, as they are at present, that there will be a sufficiency of coal. The association reports indicate that the supply of coal is rapidly increasing and needs are being filled.

A BRITISH ultimatum, threatening to sink Russian warships and submarines on sight if they are seen in the vicinity of Nikolai, on the Black Sea, has been handed to Leonid Krassin, the Bolshevik envoy in London. The message was from Earl Curzon, British secretary of foreign affairs, and is looked upon in many quarters as a declaration of war.



BOMB WRECKS TWO CARS IN SERB RULER'S TRAIN

BRUSSELS, Oct. 13.—Two coaches of a train bearing the Prince Regent of Serbia (Jugo-Slavia) was wrecked by a bomb near Sarajevo, the Montenegrin press bureau announces. The Prince Regent was unhurt. Sarajevo was the scene of the assassination of the heir apparent to the Austro-Hungarian throne which led to the world war.

Warden Kills Indoor Sports of Prisoners by Banning Scalp Perfumes.

OSWING, N. Y., Oct. 13.—To keep Sing Sing "bone dry," the use of witch-hazel, bay rum, toilet water, perfume and hair tonic in the prison barber shop or elsewhere inside the walls has been forbidden.

The order is a hard blow to the "idle rich" in Sing Sing, who, heretofore, could have most anything fragrant or odoriferous for the hair, skin or complexion if they had the money to pay the head barber for it.

Warden Lawes admitted yesterday that Sing Sing guests are to have nothing fragrant with haircuts or shaves now except scented soap and toilet powder. They contain so much alcohol that the prison officials fear lest they tempt "old toppers."

NEWS OF ALEXANDRIA AND NEARBY VIRGINIA

ALEXANDRIA, Va., Oct. 13.—The city council met in joint session last evening and after hearing from the residents of Rosemont, decided to take over the streets in that suburb as soon as the corporation attorney has prepared the necessary ordinances.

On the question of giving aid to the building of a highway between Alexandria and Winchester the council adopted a report submitted by the joint committees on street and finance, by which the city assumes indebtedness charges not to exceed \$75,000 on bonds to be issued by Fairfax county.

The board of police commissioners recommended that the police force be increased to ten or four men and that the pay of the chief be made \$175 per month, the sergeants \$150 per month and the privates \$125 per month. The matter was referred to the committee on police and finance.

A large crowd last evening attended the mass meeting at the Opera House under the auspices of the Hardins, Coolidge, Brookes Republican Club. Addresses were delivered by the Hon. Samuel J. Randall, of Philadelphia, and Mrs. Mary Logan Tucker, of Illinois.

The funeral of Mrs. Martha Taylor was held from her home in the Henry Apartment at 11 o'clock this morning. The services were conducted by the Rev. Edgar Carpenter, of Grace Episcopal Church.


