FINGER PRINT TEST TO IDENTIFY BABY

Expert Claims He Can Settle Question Which is Puzzling Atlanta Courts.

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 27.—After months of dispute in courts and out over the question as to whether two babies were "mixed" or two mothers were given the wrong babies after confinement in Grady Hospital, Judge George Bell, of the Fulton county superior court, has ordered that the question be decided by a jury, before which evidence and arguments will begin November 1.

By the application of a law of heredity which he has evolved as a result of the study of the hereditary tendencies of human beings, Mr. Alfred T. Manning, of this city, has declared that he can, by taking into consideration the finger prints of the Garpers and the Pittmans, determine the parentage of the much-disputed little Louise-Madeline, now claimed by two sets of parents. He states that he can describe the general contour and characteristics of the baby's finger prints with 79 per cent accuracy without having seen its hands.

GRAND TRUNK OFFICIAL WILL BE BURIED HERE

James F. Foley, Special Agent of Railroad, Dead in Chicago.

Solemn high mass will be celebrated at the Church of the Sacred Heart tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock for James F. Foley, chief agent of the Grand Trunk Railroad system, who died Saturday at his home in Chicago, Ill. Interment will be made in Mt. Olivet Cemetery. Mr. Foley was born in Washington July 21, 1859. He was educated in the parochial school at St. Aloysius' Church. Twenty-two years ago he went to Chicago to accept a position with the Grand Central line. BOYS STAGE FIST FIGHT WITH TEACHER REFEREE

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—Schoolroom disputes among the boys at the Webster School here, where children of twenty-two nationalities attend classes, are not settled by arbitrary fiat of a teacher. Instead, the principal of the school, Miss Alice M. Hogge, has chosen in letting the boys decide their grievances with their fists. It was learned today, and in the latest quarrel she acted as referee and second to both combatants. It was a fight to the finish in the school basement between Salvatore Sorfino and Abe Selon, both aged 12. Time was called several times to enable the combatants to rest and rinse out their mouths, and after fifteen minutes Salvatore had an unquestioned decision.

"Letting the boys fight out their troubles is the best way in a school such as the Webster," said Miss Hogge. "Of course, the fights must be fair. I never permit any serious injuries. A black eye or two, such as Abe got, is usually the limit. Abe was inclined to be a bully and got just what he needed. They will be friends now and we shall have no more trouble from them."

J. Mortenson, superintendent of schools, declared he was in favor of Miss Hogge's method, saying it is the most successful ever tried in that school.

MEMORIAL TO LAURIER UNVEILED IN CANADA

MONTREAL, Quebec, Oct. 27.—Thanksgiving Day was observed by a large number of Montrealers proceeding to the little town of Irberville, twenty miles from Montreal, where the first monument in Quebec province to the late famous French Canadian, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, was unveiled with impressive ceremonies. The monument, an imposing granite shaft, surmounted by a bronze bust of the dead leader of his race, was unveiled by his widow, Lady Laurier, in the presence of about 5,000 people from the Richelieu Valley and Montreal. A touching feature of the ceremony was that Lady Laurier was unable to see the monument she unveiled, having recently lost her sight, and she had to be led to and from the shaft to unloose the silken tricolor with which the bust was swathed.

BRITISH STRIKE AIDS AMERICAN SHIPPING

Many Vessels, Idle Since War Times, Now Being Put Back to Work.

BERLIN, Oct. 27.—Independent Socialists in Westphalia are preparing to proclaim a republic of the Rhineland, according to advices today from Dusseldorf, where the Rhineland Independent Socialists are holding a convention. It is reported that the Independent Socialists in western Prussia have organized an army of 10,000 men and that the most of them are concentrated in the Ruhr district, the seat of Germany's greatest coal fields.

AD MAN ANSWERS ATTACK ON WILSON

Sweet Disputes League Denouncement at Luncheon When Minnesota Man Speaks.

Declaring that the President should be impeached, and that he would be impeached if it were not for the fact that he is a sick man, Capt. Paul W. Collins, former progressive candidate for governor of Minnesota, launched an attack on the League of Nations and the Democratic party in general at the luncheon of the Ad Club of Washington yesterday. Captain Collins said that the people of the country were tired of the forty cent dollar, and he predicted the election of Senator Hard-

ing by an overwhelming majority. At the conclusion of Captain Collins' speech and amid much applause, a little man on the right hand side of the president of the Ad Club arose, and was introduced as Edward F. Sweet, assistant secretary of commerce, who immediately struck back at the Republican party and defended the League of Nations. "The League is the Monroe Doctrine of the World," Mr. Sweet said, and he pointed out that forty-three nations are already members, and that a league to enforce peace was organized in North Carolina in 1908, with the late Theodore Roosevelt at its head. He recalled an article in the New York Independent in 1902 in which Mr. Roosevelt advocated a league similar to the proposed one. "Senator Harding is trying to ride two horses at once. He tries to please such broad minded Republicans as William Howard Taft, who favors the League, and Senator Johnson and Borah, who oppose it. I have only seen that trick performed at the circus," Mr. Sweet concluded.
