

# BOTH PARTIES CLAIMING MD.

### More Than 3,500 Washington Residents Expected to Cast Votes in State.

Both parties are claiming Maryland on the day before the election. With the Democratic and Republican tickets running a neck-to-neck race, the State of Maryland, which normally is Democratic, promises to remain in the doubtful list until the last returns are counted.

### SEEKS TO CUT VIRGINIA VOTE.

Across the river from Washington, in the Old Dominion another story will be told tomorrow. Instead of hoping to carry Virginia, the G. O. P. is trying to see how much it can get down the usual Democratic majority.

More than 3,500 residents of Washington who can vote in Maryland will cross the District line tomorrow to cast their ballots. If they have not already done so by the Fallmore, Hagerstown, Hyattsville, Riverdale, Upper Marlboro and numerous other Maryland towns adjacent to the District, will keep automobiles running in and out of Washington for the benefit of voters. The polls will open at 6 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. throughout Maryland. Women voters intend to be on the job early.

### RACE WILL BE CLOSE.

Intense interest is being taken in the Maryland situation, owing to the close race between O. E. Weller, Republican candidate for the Senate, and Senator John Walter Smith, Democrat, who is up for re-election. Senator Smith is one of the old "war-horses" of Maryland and his supporters contend they will keep him in the saddle. The situation has been changed, however, on account of the large women's vote that is expected to be polled for Weller. Senator Smith's vote again is expected to raise havoc with his chances for re-election.

G. O. P. leaders are claiming Maryland for Senator Harding by the largest Republican majority ever recorded, though they know that the result is going to be in doubt. The Cox forces are putting up a regular Democratic fight and are confident of the vote they will receive. The G. O. P. during the last few weeks of the State campaign.

Congressman Mudd, Republican, is expected to be returned, although his victory will not be a heavy vote. Reports from the Hagerstown district indicate a substantial majority for Congressman Fred N. Zihlman, Republican of the Sixth district, who is a member of the House District Committee. Democrats claim that the Sixth district will give Senator Smith a majority.

### ONLY ONE MARK NEEDED.

In voting for President and Vice President in Maryland only one X mark is necessary. The names of Cox and Roosevelt, Democratic candidates for President and Vice President, will appear together on the ballot, and an X mark in the block opposite their names will be a vote for them. So with Harding and Coolidge, Republican candidates for President and Vice President, and with the candidates of the smaller parties.

The chief Virginia contest in which Washingtonians are interested is between Congressman R. Walton Moore, Democrat, member of the House District Committee, and John F. Brooke, Republican, both of Fairfax. Moore will be re-elected by a safe Virginia majority.

Senator Carter Glass, former Secretary of the Treasury, is practically running alone, his only opponent being the negro challenger, Folch. The polls in Virginia will open at sunrise and close at sunset. Indications point to a heavy vote of Washington Government employees, who reside in Falls Church, Clarendon, Great Falls, and other nearby Virginia points.



# LONDON SEES G. O. P. VICTORY

### Newspapers Are Interested in U. S. Election—Many Predict Harding Will Win.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—London morning papers today devoted considerable comment to the American Presidential campaign, many of them stating their belief that Senator Warren G. Harding, the Republican nominee, would be elected.

### THINKS U. S. SUSPICIOUS.

The Daily News undertook to explain what it called "the swing of the pendulum" by saying that the American people were evidently suspicious of America's European connections and opposed "President Wilson's personal government." This newspaper added:

"Despite what has been said in the Republican campaign there is no reason to believe that the United States will attempt the maintenance of austere isolation in world affairs."

The Daily News expressed the view that "length of time America may remain out depends upon the composition of Senator Harding's cabinet, if he is elected. This newspaper suggested among the possible Cabinet members under Senator Harding the following:

Elihu Root, former President Taft, Herbert Hoover, Senator Borah and Senator Johnson.

### CHRONICLE SEES SPLIT.

The Chronicle says that the accession of the Republicans to power at the time of social ferment may not have quite the result that the leaders anticipate. The Chronicle says it would not be surprised to see internal dissensions and splits follow.

"The salvation would be constructive statesmen, but there appear to be none in sight," added the Chronicle. Senator Harding's final campaign statement in Marion on Saturday, when he stated that America would enter an association of powers, but not the Paris league of nations as sponsored by President Wilson, was not received until 3 o'clock this morning. Consequently there was no comment upon it in the morning newspapers.

### Believe U. S. Will Join.

Generally speaking, the British believe that, whoever is elected there will be eventual participation of the United States in the League of Nations.

The Observer says editorially: "The election in the United States will clear away a mass of negative debris which has prevented American opinion from addressing itself freely and seriously to the world problem. Whoever wins, there is every reason to believe he will cause international cooperation as soon as the election is over. We do not fear that America will wash her hands of the other half of the world."

"America Tuesday decides the policy of her relations with the rest of the world, especially Great Britain. It would seem that undue stress has been laid upon policies and sympathies antagonistic to Britain, but these tendencies are common in every American election. They are both temporary and transient."

# HITS HARDING LABOR RECORD

### Gompers Charges Candidate Active in Organization Which Fights Unions.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, in a statement issued here today, said an investigation conducted into Senator Harding's views and practices in the industrial field has shown that "this duplicity in relation to his claim of friendship for the working people and gives a full picture of his ardent championship of industrial enslavement."

The Republican Presidential candidate, the statement said, is shown to be "an intimate and guiding participant" in the industrial life of the country. It added, there are no trade union agreements and wages are low. Mr. Gompers charged that through a system established by the employers' association, of which, he said, Senator Harding is one of the leading members, workers active in their unions are discharged and unable to obtain employment in any of the other manufacturing.

### EDITORS MAKE INQUIRY.

The investigation upon which Mr. Gompers said his statement was based was conducted by John B. F. Marlon, editor of the International Molders' Union Journal, and Chester M. Wright, assistant editor of the American Federationist and a member of the Typographical Union.

The statement asserted the Manufacturers' Association of Marion is organized primarily to prevent the organization of wage earners, and that the maximum wage to be paid the employees of any of its members and provides that no employe can secure employment from any other than his present employer without the consent of the employer.

### HARDING'S AFFILIATIONS.

### REPRISAL UNION MOVE.

The statement charged the Marion Manufacturers' Association with guarding its membership so closely that it is impossible to secure a roster of members; that its meetings are held behind locked doors and its records inaccessible and adds that it uses cards and other coded paraphernalia in its work.

### BOY BLOWN TO BITS BY SHELL LEFT BY CIRCUS

LEXINGTON, Ky., Nov. 1.—Chester Peak, an eight-year-old boy, was blown to atoms, and several children were injured when a one-pound TNT army shell, which he was hammering at, exploded here yesterday. Nearby buildings were shaken by the explosion.

A thorough search of this section of the country is being made, as more than 500 unexploded shells left from a circus presented by the First Division were thrown into the Ohio river at high water, and many are now being recovered by children and are a favorite plaything. Twenty-six shells have been recovered.

# Woman Vote to Swing Election, Say Feminine Leaders in This City

Veteran political observers here agreed today that only the prophet who knows the answer to the Great Enigma can predict accurately in the results of tomorrow's elections. The new woman voter will be the determining factor in the election. How she will vote is the Great Enigma.

She is X, the unknown quantity, in the most puzzling problem the politicians have ever been called upon to solve. What she will do with her vote seems a mystery as elusive as Mona Lisa's smile.

A conservative estimate of her combined voting strength is 20,000,000, according to the figures furnished today by the National Woman's Party. Leaders of the party and officials of the League of Women Voters predict that at least 90 per cent of these 20,000,000 women will go to the polls tomorrow. Men political leaders say that no more than 10,000,000 will cast votes.

### CAN CONTROL ELECTION.

Even if only one-half of the woman's vote is cast, it is conceded that the new woman voter will elect the next President of the United States. With even less than 10,000,000 votes she can control the election.

President Wilson's election last time was attributed to the woman vote in the West. The issue then, as now, was war. But the angles were not so puzzling to women. "The power of women has always been the fact that men consider them a mystery."

### DENIES SHE IS MYSTERY.

"The woman voter isn't a mystery—the men just think she is," said Mrs. Abby Scott Baker, chairman of the National Woman's Party. "The power of women has always been the fact that men consider them a mystery. Women have studied the issues of the campaign with clear judgment. Don't think mere appeal to their sentiments will cause them to vote for or against the League of Nations. The politicians can't fool them. They are as capable of judging for themselves what the League means."

"She will have a large majority of them vote as their husbands, or other of their menfolk. It is my opinion that most of them will vote independently."
