BODY OF A. E. F. ENGINEER IN CAPITAL FOR BURIAL

Remains of Thomas Jeffrey Doran Here From France.

The body of Thomas Jeffrey Doran, member of the American Expeditionary Force, who died of pneumonia during the influenza epidemic last year, arrived in this city today for interment. Services will be held tomorrow afternoon at the funeral chapel of W. R. Spears Company, 1208 H street northwest and burial will be in Congressional Cemetery.

Mr. Doran was born in Mattoon, Ill., August 30, 1885. He was brought to Washington by his parents at an early age. He was graduated from McKinley Manual Training School, and studied a year at George Washington University. He later went to the University of Michigan where he took an engineering course and graduated in 1912.

Following his graduation, the Government offered him a position in the Philippines, which he accepted. He remained there for about a year, and then entered the service of the Southern Railway system. He was made superintendent at Mobile, Ala.

On May 21, 1918, Mr. Doran enlisted in the corps of engineers, and in July of that year arrived in France. He was placed in charge of construction work at Giverny, France, and rapidly rose to the rank of master engineer, senior grade.

He was a member of the Kappa Alpha Fraternity, Seina Lodge, No. 27, F. A. M., and the Royal Arch. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Emma C. Doran; two sisters, Mrs. C. R. McClure, of Chevy Chase, and Miss Helen Fay Doran, and one brother, John Hendricks Doran, of Knoxville, Tenn.

MRS. ELKINS PLEADS FOR MORE ALIMONY

Sets \$485 as Necessary Amount For Support of Late Senator's Grandson.

Alleging that Elaine Elkins son of the late Senator Stephen E. Elkins, from whom she secured an absolute divorce recently, has paid nothing to her for the support of their infant since April 1 last, that she has been obliged to pay large sums of money for the latter's support, and that she has been forced to borrow money for the purpose, Mrs. Mary Keenan Elkins today filed a petition compelling Mr. Elkins to show cause why he should not make adequate provisions for the support and maintenance of Stephen E. Elkins, III, their infant son.

Mrs. Elkins declares that the sum allowed by Mr. Elkins for her support is barely sufficient to maintain her and the child. She says she needs \$485 a month for that purpose and declares that her husband has considerable means, being worth about \$1,000,000.

Itemizing the amount of \$55 which Mrs. Elkins says is necessary for the support of their child, she details \$100 for her apartment rent; \$50 for rent, \$25 for half of cook's wages, \$75 for half of doctor's and dental bills, medicines and trained nurses; \$10 for kindergarten books, uniforms, etc.; \$20 for clothes and \$75 for incidentals, including traveling expenses and a vacation for the child and his nurse.

Chief Justice McCoy, June 9, last, signed an interlocutory decree of absolute divorce awarding Mrs. Elkins the custody of their child and the decree was made final September 24, last. In the decree stipulations were made that the question of the amount which Elkins was to pay for the support of the child be left open for agreement between the parties and their counsel. Mrs. Elkins declares that neither of the parties have been able to arrive at a definite agreement in the matter.

D. C. ASKED TO CELEBRATE LANDING OF PILGRIMS

Commissioner J. Thilman Hendrick today made a personal appeal to the people of Washington to join in celebrating the tercentenary of the landing of the Pilgrims in America.

Mr. Hendrick announced that plans for the celebration, which begins with a mass meeting at Central High School on November 17 and ends with a float and torch parade on Thanksgiving Eve, were complete.

Robert Lansing, former Secretary of State, will preside at the Central High meeting. Cannon E. A. Burroughs, of Hartford College, Oxford, England and Bishop William F. Dowell of the tercentenary committee will be the principal speakers.

RENT COMMISSION DECIDES 12 CASES

Allows Seven Increases, Makes Four Reductions, and Leaves One Unchanged.

The District Rent Commission this morning handed down twelve determinations allowing increases in rental in seven cases, ordering reductions in four and setting the same rental in one case. While increases were allowed in a majority of the cases the advances in rentals fall far short of the amounts asked for by the landlords.

In the case of Fred Card against Harry Standford the commission permitted an increase of from \$34.50 to \$37.50 a month for Apartment 21, The Hiramhurst, 1229 Twelfth street northwest.

The commission ordered a rental of \$70 a month reduced to \$62 in the case of John W. Zimmerman against the Northwest Savings Bank for Apartment 2, 1789 Columbia Road northwest. The owner asked \$90 a month. He was denied an increase.

In the case of Fred R. Franzoni against Mrs. J. Higgins, the commission set \$42.50 as a fair rental for apartment 9, the Randolph, 1715 Lincoln road northeast. The former rental was \$41, and \$51 was proposed.

A rental of \$90 a month was ordered reduced to \$50 for 1033 Lamont street northwest in the case of Mary A. Carpenter against Joseph Shapiro.

In the case of Mrs. Irene Whittemore against Moore & Hill, Inc., the commission set \$40.50 as a fair rental for apartment 104, 1915 I street northwest. The former rental was \$37.50 and \$46.50 was asked.

In the case of John Murphy against the Fidelity Storage Company, involving apartment 35, the Berkshire, 1412 Chapin street northwest, the commission allowed a rental of \$27.50 to be paid for \$20. The defendant was denied possession of the property.

In the case of Walter Johnson against Mrs. Lottie Cotter, the commission set \$22.50 for 3218 O street northwest the former rental being \$20.50 and \$25.50 being asked.

The commission allowed an increase of \$3 in the rental for 1020 Seventh street southwest in the case of Mrs. W. C. de Walt against Floyd E. Davis. The former rental was \$50 and a request was made to raise it to \$18.

In the case of Daniel T. Scarlet, Sr., and others against Floyd E. Davis, the commission set \$23.50 as a fair rental for \$20.50 Seventh street southwest and \$22.50 for 822 Seventh street. The former rental was \$23 and \$27.50 was asked.

In the case of Rachael Clay against H. H. Bergman & Co., the commission set \$20 for 623 street rental for 1234 Sixth street northwest, the former rental being \$30, and \$35 was asked.

The commission decided that \$25 was a fair rental and refused an increase to \$30 for 623 street rental east in the case of John H. Caine against Patrick Kennedy.
