Millionaires of Italy, And Not Reds, Accused Of Retarding Progress

ROME, Nov. 7.—To a student of social questions the fact that Italy is struggling against a group of millionaire plutocrats rather than against an unruly mass of workers, is clearly revealed after a few days sojourn in the industrial centers of the north.

BROKERS DENY CHARGES

Will Probe Gouging Claims. Daniels Indorses Board in Rent Investigation.

Certain that a number of socially prominent Washingtonians would "blush for shame" if the public were told their names and knew to what extent they are profiteering in real estate, a board of navy officers is expected to be appointed this week to hear personal complaints of officers in the Navy Department about rent profiteering and to investigate the facts in order to obtain a list of "guilty parties" to be used in a campaign of "pitiless publicity."

Wealthy Peach King Died Suddenly Following Mysterious Stomach Ailment.
