GLUCK TELLS OF RIP HERE

Says Arnstein Came to Washington to Dispose of Stolen Securities.

While under a grueling cross-examination this morning, Joseph Gluck, confessed bond thief, testified he had agreed to furnish hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of stolen securities to Nick Cohn and others implicated in the theft of bonds from messengers employed in the Wall street financial district, at a profit of 8 per cent.

TURNED STATE'S EVIDENCE.

Gluck, who formerly was employed by a New York broker, has turned State's evidence and was brought here to testify in the trial of Julius W. (Nicky) Arnstein, Amos W. Sullivan, Norman S. Bowles and Wilen W. Easterday, before Justice Gould and a jury on indictment charging them with conspiracy to bring stolen securities into the District.

The cross-examination was conducted by Attorney William J. Fallon, of counsel for Arnstein. Gluck admitted that he had never been given money by Arnstein, although he testified that Arnstein had accompanied himself and Cohn when they came to Washington and went to other cities to dispose of the stolen securities he had received from his brother, Irving Gluck and other Wall Street messengers.

"Arnstein never gave you a cent," the lawyer asked.

"The witness hesitated a minute and replied: "No, sir."

"Who paid you for your work?" asked the lawyer.

"I received pay from Cohn."

"The witness, however, had previously testified that he had negotiated stolen securities before he met Cohn or Arnstein.

Asked about the trip he made to Washington with Arnstein and Cohn, when he carried 500 shares of Atlantic, Gulf, and West Indies Steamship, and 300 shares of St. Louis and San Francisco railroad stock, which had been stolen in New York and which are alleged to have been negotiated in the Capital by Sullivan, the witness said:

The witness asserted Cohn negotiated these securities while he and Arnstein rolled about Washington in an automobile.

On Thursday Gluck testified that the night he and Arnstein and Cohn left New York to bring the securities to Washington they met Day W. Sullivan, one of the defendants, on trial here, at the Pennsylvania railroad station in the Metropolis. He also testified that on the night of their arrival in Washington he had seen Arnstein and Cohn talking to Sullivan in front of the Willard Hotel.

Attorney Fallon attempted to discredit this testimony, asking the witness whether or not he had not testified, only four weeks ago in New York, that he did not know Sullivan.

The witness admitted making the statement, declaring he did not know Sullivan at the time he testified in New York, vehemently attacked the veracity of the witness, particularly as it applied to Arnstein and Sullivan. Counsel for the defendants apparently attempted to show that the mysterious and elusive "Nick" Cohn, who is a fugitive, was the brains of the New York theft, and that Arnstein and Sullivan and the other defendants were innocent tools of the fugitive.

Gluck testified upon cross-examination that he had been told, both by Arnstein and Cohn, not to dress flashily, to avoid causing suspicion. He said he had been thus warned in Habaken, but he could not recall when Arnstein had thus advised him.

The witness admitted that only three or four weeks after this admission he had purchased a \$4,000 automobile. He denied, however, that he had given his father money he had received from the stolen securities to purchase an expensive home outside of New York.



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
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
