Thus with youth and beauty introduced into the picture, and based on sound logic, I had as fine a story as I ever care to direct.

Nor did the introduction of those elements keep me from giving a sympathetic rendering of Mr. Child's story. In fact when he sees the picture, he will make me very happy by assuring me that they added just a wee bit to its value.

The finish at first puzzled me, as I am not one of those directors who believe in the artistic but uncommercial tragic ending. As George M. Cohan says, "Always leave them laughing when you say good-bye."

It was very obvious that if I let "Helirotrope Harry" live there would be no story. I think I may be pardoned for claiming a rather happy inspiration—to show the consummation of the happiness Harry died for, and as the young ones stand at the altar plighting their troth.



FIRST photographs to reach Washington showing the damage done by torch and bomb when British soldiers raided the town of Mallow, in County Cork, Ireland.

They were taken by Monty Roche, a photographer in Mallow, and were received yesterday by Daniel E. Doran, chairman of the Washington Mallow Committee, which is raising funds to aid the sufferers in Ireland.

The top photograph shows a group of Mallow citizens with the few household effects they had been able to save from their burning homes. At the lower left are seen the ruins of O'Connell's pharmacy, Haniver's restaurant, Quinn's boot and shoe warehouse, and Quarles' drapery warehouse. At the lower right are the ruins of Ford's drapery shop.



WOES OF MALLOW TOLD IN PICTURES

Distress in Irish Town Also Vividly Described in Letters of Residents.

The first pictures of the destruction of the town of Mallow, in County Cork, which has been adopted by the Padraic H. Pearce Council, of the American Association for the Recognition of the Irish Republic, have been received here by Daniel E. Doran, chairman of the Washington Mallow committee.

Accompanying the pictures were letters from the Rev. Canon C. Corbett, pastor of the Mallow parish, and from Thomas Wrixson, vice president of Mallow, in which a vivid picture of distress, borne out by the pictures, is painted.

Mr. Doran also received several letters from various residents in Mallow who were immediate victims of the British invasion in Ireland.

According to the letters, damage amounting to more than \$1,000,000 was done when the Seventeenth Lancers set fire to the town. The attack came in the dead of night, when the people of Mallow were compelled to flee to the fields and cemeteries for shelter.

The principal industries of the town were wiped out and more than one-third of the working population is now idle. Most of the inhabitants of Mallow are in dire need.

TOWN ALWAYS PEACEFUL

Just why the military should attack the town is not known. Mallow has always been one of the most peaceful towns in the little green Isle. The excuse offered by the officers of the Lancers was that they were in search of two members of the Irish Republic who were alleged to have lived in Mallow.

Not being able to find them, the soldiers set fire to the whole town to impress upon the people the danger that threatens those Irishmen who are not loyal to the crown.

Up to that time only a few Sinn Feiners were prominently identified with the Sinn Fein cause. Since the burning of the town practically every inhabitant has become a Sinn Feiner just to show his contempt for the British government.

The people of the town did not dare to extinguish the fires until after the lancers had retired. Several young Irishmen attempted to put out the flames in their own homes and were shot by the military. When the fire was well under way the lancers left Mallow and the townmen, with the assistance of several "Black and Tan" officers who had taken part in the burning, succeeded in getting the flames under control.

The Black and Tan officers aided in putting out the fire, not because of their humane sentiments, but because of a disregard for the orders of the British military officers. A bitter hatred exists between the military police and the soldiers.

LETTERS CITE OUTRAGES

In addition to the burning and destruction, the letters cited instances of outrages committed in Mallow, one young man being shot at noon while walking near the barracks, and another being compelled to halt and throw up his hands by a British soldier, who "smashed his mouth" with the butt of a rifle.

The young man was so terribly injured that he will never again be able to articulate. More than \$15,000 has already been

AMERICAN PONIES' STIR LONDON STAGE

British Chorus Girls Indignant at Invasion by Beauties From This Side.

LONDON, Dec. 21.—British chorus girls are strenuously objecting to the importation of American show girls and "ponies" to the London stage.

The matter was brought to a head by the arrival of seventeen American beauties from the Greenwich Village Follies, brought here by C. B. Cochran, London theatrical manager, for a new production.

Miss Hilda Desmond, one of the best-known beauties in London choruses, pleads that London managers should give preference to English girls, especially when there is so much unemployment on the British stage.

"If American girls are not only more beautiful in face or figure, but can do their work better than we can, then we shall have to give way, but I say that English girls of the stage need not fear comparison with any other type," Miss Desmond said.

"Yet managers are bringing over American girls, whose presence on the London stage means that so many English girls are thrown out of employment."
