

**10,000 MINERS AGAIN
THREATEN TO STRIKE**
WILKESBARRE, Pa., Jan. 27.—Ten thousand mine workers in the Pennsylvania and Hillside Coal Company collieries who have kept the Pittston section in a state of turmoil by strikes, on and off, since last

July, served notice on company officials today that there would be a strike on Monday if "hustlers" employed at the Butler Colliery are not discharged.

**BRIDE FINDS MATE
IS SKILLED ROBBER**

Brooklyn Youth Posed As Financier, But Was Daring Burglar.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—Thomas R. Jones, twenty, built like a champion of the ring, but mild of manner, and his wife, Lena Phillips Jones, eighteen, frail, dark-eyed, and generally adorable, in November came to live with Miss Elsie K. Easton, at 202 Lincoln place, Brooklyn.

Miss Easton's grandfather built the Lincoln place house, and his tone and dignity increased with successive generations. Forged by economic considerations to let some of her rooms, the mistress of 202 Lincoln place took a motherly interest in many of her lodgers. Particularly was this true of the case of young Mrs. Jones, who won further sympathy by confiding to the spinster that she was an expectant mother.

HE WORKED LATE.
Other dwellers in the house were touched by the manifest affection of the tall, handsome Jones boy for his bride. Often he was out late at night—so late that he explained he could not go to his clerical position in the financial district until afternoon—"they make me work pretty late," he said.

Yesterday Miss Easton learned the manner and method of the youth's "work." For young Jones was arraigned in the Flatbush police court and held in \$10,000 bail, accused by the police of a series of robberies that may have netted him as much as \$85,000 in the last year.

"A burglar but a business man," Captain of Detectives McCluskey termed the prisoner after he had confessed a dozen robberies of homes in the Borough Park and Flatbush sections of Brooklyn. The police applied the term because the youth told them: "I would have been going straight now if my investments hadn't gone wrong. When I had a big wad from my stealings I figured I could invest it in Wall Street, earn an income of a few thousand a year, and forget what had happened. But the recent slump in the market wiped out my profits."

WIFE SOBS AND LEAVES.
After the key had been turned on the youth in Raymond street jail, however, the news was broken to the little wife. She sobbed, then collected a few belongings, and left the Lincoln place house, saying: "I am going to my aunt. Then I will go to see Tim if I feel strong enough. If he stole he did it for me."

I ought to stand by him. He has been so sweet to me."
Jones was traced through a \$2,500 diamond brooch he stole from the home of Mrs. Fannie Bernstein, wife of a wealthy suit manufacturer, at 1259 Forty-eighth street, Borough Park, on the evening of December 27. Just around the corner lived Jones' parents, at 1349 Forty-seventh street. His father is a postal employe, well liked and industrious.

**EUROPEAN OIL MEN
FORM NEW COMBINE**

LONDON, Jan. 27.—As a reply to American activity in the oil markets of France a new group of French and British oil magnates has been formed. The Anglo-Persian Oil Company, of which the British government holds a large number of shares, and a French combine with a capital of \$20,000,000 in all, have formed a company for the importation into France of crude and refined oils and for the refining and distribution of gasolines.

This is taken to be a necessary corollary to the San Remo agreement between Britain and France regarding the allocation of the Mesopotamian oil fields.

By the new agreement the Anglo-Persian Oil Company will obtain a new market for their oil and British industry is expected to benefit by the manufacture of the necessary refining plant. Oil tankers are already being built in British yards in connection with the scheme.

The British government in 1914 subscribed for 2,000,000 ordinary \$5 shares in the Anglo-Persian Oil Company, \$5,000 worth of preference shares and also invested \$1,000,000 in debenture stock. By this means the government secured controlling interest in the company. Last year, when the capital was increased, the British government was stated to have subscribed in its proportion.
