

CROWDSHONOR DEAD CARDINAL

Baltimore Cathedral Thronged By Mourners at Mass for the Laity.

BALTIMORE, March 30.—The fast services preceding the culminating funeral ceremonies for James Cardinal Gibbons began at 10 o'clock this morning with the mass at the cathedral for the laity.

PURPLE IS MOURNING COLOR. There has been no announced change in the arrangements for the funeral mass of requiem or other exercises tomorrow.

The state funeral procession of high church dignitaries and priests, headed by Cardinal William O'Connell, of Boston, and Cardinal Louis Ginn, of Canada, garbed in purple, the official mourning color of the cardinal, will move at 9:55 a. m. sharp and proceed from Calvert Hall across the street into the cathedral.

At the hour for the beginning of the funeral a band will fall on the State while its citizens for one minute pay silent tribute to the memory of the prelate-citizen. Tomorrow's services will be attended by representatives of foreign nations, the officials of the city, State, and National.

JEWIS RENDERS TRIBUTE.

There was an ever-increasing number of arriving clergy today. Among the arrivals were Archbishop John W. Shaw, of New Orleans; the Rev. Thomas J. Weldon, pastor of St. Joseph's Church, New Orleans, and the Very Rev. C. Polk, rector of the three Redemptorist churches in that city, and the Rev. W. E. Katzenberger, president of Niagara University, Niagara Falls, N. Y. While in Baltimore, Cardinal O'Connell will be a guest at the archiepiscopal residence, while Cardinal Ginn, will be a guest at St. Mary's Seminary.

A cablegram of high tribute has been received from American Ambassador Johnson to Italy, Robert Underwood Johnson. The convention of the National Federation of Ukrainian Jews in session here, praised the cardinal as a friend of the Jewish people. The Baltimore Press Club, of which he had long been a member, adopted appropriate resolutions on the death of the cardinal.

MURDER FARM TRIAL ORDERED

Georgia Governor Takes Hand in "Peonage" Slayings—Asks Speedy Justice.

ATLANTA, March 30.—The most sensational development in the alleged Jasper county peonage murder, in which the bodies of eleven negroes have been found, came yesterday when Huland, Julius and Marvin Williams, sons of the man now in Fulton county jail charged with responsibility for the alleged murders, were accused by a witness of attempting a general inter-racial clash in an effort to secure the freedom of their father.

TO FAKE INTER-RACIAL CLASH. It was charged that the plan was for a number of white men to enter Jasper county and to spread the report that several weeks ago they saw an automobile load of negroes near the Walker's bridge over the Alcovy river and that two dead negroes were sent allegedly from negroes to whites and the impression was to be created that a wholesale slaughter was being planned.

The young man who is responsible for this story is now in the Newton county jail, but his name is withheld. He is quoted as saying he was offered a \$500 bribe by Huland Williams. A letter supporting the assertion that the negroes were slain because of their resistance to peonage, and also to inquire into any possible connection with the affair of Williams' three sons, has been asked by Governor Dorsey.

GOVERNOR TAKES HAND. Investigation by the Jasper county grand jury of the alleged murder with a view of indictment of John S. Williams and Clyde Manning, a negro, who is said to have told officials Williams had the negroes slain because of their resistance to peonage, and also to inquire into any possible connection with the affair of Williams' three sons, has been asked by Governor Dorsey.

TRIAL IN THREE WEEKS. At the same time dispatches from Covington announce that Solicitor-General Brand, of the Stone Mountain Circuit, has declared Williams and Manning will go to trial at Covington within three weeks. They are already under indictment there in connection with the finding of the bodies of three other negroes alleged to have been taken into that county and drowned. Mr. Brand and John B. Hutcheson are in Atlanta to discuss the matter with the Governor.

Graham Wright, Assistant State Attorney-General, who is aiding in the Jasper county investigation, it is announced at the Governor's office. Governor Dorsey spent several hours yesterday in conference with Mr. Wright, Attorney-General Denny, Solicitor-General Campbell, of the Ocmulgee Circuit, and Federal agents, who have been inquiring into the alleged peonage conditions.

LUCILLE PUGH RAPS STILLMAN TACTICS

Society Attorney Says No Man Should Sully Name of His Children.

NEW YORK, March 30.—"What kind of a father is it who deliberately brings the name of his children's mother and blast the careers of his children with notoriety and disgrace?"

WANTS REMEDIAL LAW. This was the statement yesterday of Miss Lucille Pugh, young society woman and attorney.

Miss Pugh is particularly interested in the double triangle that is the Stillman case, in that she believes it to be the outcome of social indiscretions which she would remedy by a national divorce law.

It would, however, check the tendency to be blown into the divorce court on every passing breeze by providing for division of all property accumulated during the marital period on a fifty-fifty basis between husband and wife.

BACK TO OLD STORY. "It all goes back to the old story of a man and woman entirely at odds with each other in instinct, disposition, ambitions and in every way, living together because of a tie imposed by civil law. Certainly no religious law really would counsel such hypocrisy."

MUST EDUCATE WOMEN. "Of course we never shall get into real man and wife equality until women become educated to self-reliance and independence."

NO MORE CAMOUFLAGE. "What do folks care? This is a test of what folks care, says Miss Shackleton. Twenty years ago, she finds, they fought frames to puff out the hair, false curls, switches, stiffening for absurd sleeves, binding for horrible street-sweeping skirt hems. Nowadays the shop counters are heaped with wigs, hair curlers, manicure sets and shampoo powders, while we have no evidence that Juliet even possessed a toothbrush."

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'Carries Love Of the World'

Edwin Markham Writes of Naturalist's Death in Feeling Lines.

NEW YORK, March 30.—Edwin Markham, famous American poet, author of "The Man With the Hoe," at the request of the International News Service today penned the following touching lines in honor of John Burroughs, widely known naturalist, whose death occurred yesterday. The poem reads:

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WILSON URGED TO BE EXPLICIT

"Envoy's Best Service Will Be Frankness With Harding," is Hapgood's Belief.

When Rene Viviani sees President Harding today, the greatest service he can render will be to tell exactly what France means to do about the German predicament.

APPEALS TO EMOTIONS. His visit seems scarcely likely to do much clearing up. He is an orator, who can be enjoyed even by those who understand no French, but he appeals to the emotions. He can draw again a touching picture of bleeding France, but there is no expectation that he will contribute much to giving us intellectual points of the compass.

President Harding has laid down pretty nearly certain general principles about our foreign policy, but general principles, couched in negative form are one thing; applying them to the French example that comes up is another.

WHAT GERMANY CAN PAY. The German situation can be analyzed into a few outstanding elements. According to the best equipped and most impartial experts, Germany can pay a principal of from twelve to seventeen thousand millions dollars, with interest spread over a long time. The German experts in Paris admit that the total amount of the reparations is not to be bluffed for about seven thousand millions.

There is no dispute in reality about their being responsible for the damage done by the war, but the question of how to pay for more than they can pay. Fifteen thousand millions would be a fair arrangement.

Confusion has been widespread because of the "sunder" and water to the civilian population was interpreted by counting discharged soldiers as part of the civilian population, thus apparently doubling the indemnity.

CITES EXAMPLES. For example, had it not been for this device, South Africa, Canada, and Australia would be nothing but the signature of General Smuts to the memorandum suggesting this method of computation.

Instead of taking a cool, intellectual point of view, as the general public would do, M. Viviani will again show the wounds of bleeding France. That is a natural human thing to do, but it hurts the cause of France.

The world admits all the sentimental and many of the moral arguments, but it wants to come down to severe economic considerations.

THE FRENCH HAVE MADE THEIR MINDS UP ON AN ALTERNATIVE. They constantly say that they must have one of two things: either safety or indemnity. They maintain that Germany is trying to cheat on the indemnity.

THEY WANT TO BE SAFE IN THE DISMEMBERMENT OF GERMANY. The Germans make the mistake of thinking this threat a sheer bluff.

FRANCE'S MISTAKE. They reason that if the French to dismember Germany, they could decrease the production of Germany and therefore threaten the life of all Europe, including France. That is all true enough, but the Germans do not always remember that the French do not think in economic terms.

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CUBA 'BOSSSED' GOMEZ CLAIMS

Island Republic's Hero Here Charges Fraud and Terror Forced Elections.

Gen. Jose Miguel Gomez, hero of the Cuban war of independence, former president of Cuba, and candidate of the Liberal party for that office in the recent elections, voiced the hope here today that the United States would order new elections in Cuba under the supervision of American officers, and sounded a warning against the possible consequences if the Conservatives are allowed to place Zayas in the presidency.

PEOPLE ARE DESPERATE. General Gomez asserts that he is ready to abide by any resolution dictated in justice by the Government of the United States and that the liberal party is not a revolutionary party. He says, however, that violence and intimidation on the part of conservative leaders have rendered the people desperate and that they may get beyond party control.
