A CHRONICLE OF EVENTS WITH SIDE LIGHTS ON THE MEN AND WOMEN WHO MAKE UP WASHINGTON'S COMPLEX AND INTERESTING SOCIAL LIFE

**THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. HARDING** will be hosts to-night at the first official dinner given at the White House in the present Administration, their distinguished company of guests being asked to meet Rene Viviani, former premier of France. The Vice President and Mrs. Coolidge and the Secretary of State and Mrs. Hughes will be present. Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge were to have been dinner guests tonight of Mrs. Thomas F. Walsh, but the dinner was postponed until April 10, when they were invited to dine with the President and Mrs. Harding, an invitation to the White House being considered a command.

Following the dinner the Undersecretary of State and Mrs. Henry P. Fletcher will take a number of the guests, the Vice President and Mrs. Coolidge among them, to the Chinese ball at Wardman Park Hotel.

Mrs. Harding will be at home this afternoon by appointment to a number of guests. Yesterday afternoon she received M. Viviani, who called at the White House accompanied by the French ambassador, M. Jusserand, and lingered for a chat with his hosts. Mrs. Harding's secretary, Miss Laura Harlan, was with her. Later in the afternoon the "First Lady of the Land" was hostess to a group of newspaper women who had tea with her in the Red Room.

The guests, who numbered approximately thirty-five, assembled in the Blue Room and entered the Red Room in a body. They were presented to Mrs. Harding by I. H. Hoover, who has been chief usher at the White House through several Administrations. The hostess wore a charming gown of the popular new capton crepe in a becoming shade of gray, patterned with clusters of bright colored flowers. The skirt was cut in points and laid in fine pleats and the bodice opened over a vest of oyster colored georgette and had a collar of the same soft material. "Harding

blue" satin was used to form the skirt. Mrs. Harding wore the beautiful diamond slide, which was President Harding's gift as a souvenir of the inauguration, upon the black velvet band which she affects; and she also had on glittering headpiece, chain, Gray hose and gray satin ties completed her costume.

Gracious and kindly in manner, Mrs. Harding had a word of personal greeting for each of her guests. Some of them met the President's wife for the first time, but others had opportunity to renew a pleasant acquaintance. Mrs. Harlan presided at the small table drawn up before the great south window and poured tea from the historic urn which Mrs. Wilson used when, as Mistress of the White House, she entertained for Mrs. Harding and from which Mrs. Harding afterward served tea to her predecessor. A graceful vase of Mrs. Warren's roses decorated the table and the room was sweet with flowers.

The Vice President and Mrs. Coolidge, who are dining out on Monday night, will afterward occupy a box at Polk's for Walter Hampden's production of "Macbeth," which will have its Washington premiere that evening. Senator Henry Cabot Lodge and Senator and Mrs. Philander C. Knox are other lovers of Shakespeare who will have boxes.

Mrs. Coolidge, wife of the Vice President, was entertained at luncheon today by Mrs. Oliver Wendell Holmes.

This afternoon Mrs. Coolidge is the guest of Mrs. Joseph I. France and Mrs. Selden P. Spencer, who have a box party for Miss Tarsova's concert at the National, which is being given as a benefit for Friendship House. Surgeon General and Mrs. Merritt W. Ireland are also in the party.

The Belgian Ambassador and Baroness de Cartier and the Serbian Minister and Mme. Grouitch will be the honor guests at the dinner which Mr. and Mrs. Warren Delano Robbins are giving tonight before the Chinese Ball. Covers will be laid for eighteen.

Lady Geddes, wife of the British Ambassador, was hostess at an informal luncheon today for Miss Masters and Miss Strong, of Dobbs' Ferry School, who are in Washington to confer with the Dobbs alumnae with regard to the endowment fund now being raised.

Yesterday Lady Geddes was a guest at the buffet luncheon which Mrs. Charles Lester gave for Miss Masters and Miss Strong, at which many of the Dobbs alumnae were present.
