

# H. C. L. IS PUT TO RETAILERS

## Rail Executive Tells Senate Probers Rates Not to Blame for Prices.

Questions designed to shed additional light upon the plight of the nation's railroads and the causes for their present condition were directed today at Julius Kruttschnitt, president of the board of directors of the Southern Pacific, when he resumed the stand as the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee continued its investigation of the transportation situation.

### WITNESS IS GRILLED.

Statistics showing in detail, various phases of the operation of the steam lines since 1916 were in the hands of members of the committee. Their inquiries ranged from demands for more information concerning wages and costs of maintenance and equipment, to a discussion of Kruttschnitt's charges that the roads were severely hampered in their attempt to compete with vessels of the United States.

Shipping Board, inland waterways and Federal highways.

Kruttschnitt continued to maintain that wages of many railroad workmen were too high and again denied that rail rates could be held responsible for the ultimate cost of agricultural and other products.

**CITIES LABOR COST LEAP.**  
He referred to a statement filed with the committee which shows that labor costs of class 1 railroads were greater in 1920 than in 1917 by more than 115 per cent, and that the gross revenues of the carriers during that period had increased by less than 5 per cent. The enactment of the Adamson law in 1917 and the operation of the roads by the United States Railroad Administration were blamed for this condition.

Senator Pomerene, Democrat of Ohio, outlined to Kruttschnitt the plight of northern Ohio brick manufacturers who were unable to ship their product from Canton, Ohio, to Detroit, Mich., because of high freight rates.

"Does it not seem reasonable and a sound business principle," he asked, "for the roads to make rate reductions at these points in order that their traffic may be increased?"

Kruttschnitt replied that the roads would have "no net income left" if rates were reduced and "that it was hardly fair for manufacturers who made big profits without Government regulations, to now make demands upon the railroads for cut rates."

### URGES "GET-TOGETHER" MEET.

Pomerene urged that the railroads and manufacturers "get together" to negotiate rates, but that Kruttschnitt be asked, but that the appeals should be made to the Interstate Commerce Commission.

## SENATOR OUT AFTER D.C. PHRENOLOGISTS

Senator Ball, chairman of the Senate District Committee, today introduced a bill placing a \$25 license fee on phrenologists and classifying them along with palmists, etc. The bill was referred to the District Committee.

## EXEMPTS OFFICIALS FROM D. C. TAXATION

Cabinet officers, members of Congress and other persons in the service of the Government elected for a definite term of office, "are no longer subject to taxation in the District of Columbia," according to the terms of a bill Senator Ball introduced in the Senate today.

All other persons who reside here for a period of six months are to be considered citizens of the District for taxation purposes, unless they can show that they pay a tangible or intangible personal property tax in other jurisdictions.

The measure also amends existing laws so as to provide for a permanent board of assistant assessors to consist of six members, instead of five, this board to act with the District assessors on a board of equalization in reviewing appeals of tax cases.

## DETECTION HOME NEEDS MORE HELP

### Attendants Wanted to Care for Children—Examination Set for June 8.

Have you always wanted to work with little boys and girls? Here's your chance.

Examination to fill the position of attendant in the Bureau of Prisons is announced by the Civil Service Commission today for June 8.

The duties will be to care for the moral and physical welfare of the children in the boys' and girls' detention department. Entrance salaries are \$1,000 the second year, \$1,500 the third year, and \$1,850 for sergeant. These are the highest salaries paid under the Government and very interesting work.

## TEACHERS PETITION FOR SALARY RAISE

Representatives of the elementary high school, special and administrative groups, acting as a committee of the teachers' council, appeared before the superintendent of Schools Frank W. Hallou yesterday and presented tentative salary figures asked by the teachers. The teachers are seeking an approximate minimum of \$1,500 for teachers who now have a minimum of \$1,200 plus the 1920 bonus for teachers.

Reclassification does not provide for the bonus for teachers. Completion of a salary scale upon which school officials may agree in presenting the salary question to Congress is expected next week. Conclusions will then be presented to the Board of Education for indorsement.
